# **Imaginary Island Project 2012**

For over 25 years, Brunswick Junior High sixth graders have created imaginary islands. The assignment is the culminating activity of the landform and map skill units. The assignment has been modified over the years, but the goals have remained the same. The contents of this packet outline the project requirements, expectations, and evaluation.

### Goals:

- To have students demonstrate knowledge about landforms and parts of a map.
- To have students use reasoning and critical thinking while making important decisions.
- To have students use their imagination and create something they are proud of.
- To have students be excited about their work.
- To have students connect real world issues/topic to their imaginary worlds.
- To have students evaluate their own work and the work of their peers.
- To have students orally explain their islands to small and large groups.

Educational Objectives (These objectives make sure that instruction stimulates and develops students' higher-order thinking skills.)

- The students will demonstrate knowledge of various landforms.
- The students will create their own imaginary island.
- The students will describe particular aspects of their island.
- The students will make many decisions regarding their finished product.

Please review the guidelines for this project with mom or dad, so they understand the steps and requirements of this exciting project.

### The nuts and bolts...



- \* This project will be done almost entirely at home.
- \* This project should be worked on regularly if not daily.
- \* Don't wait until the last few days. It's labor intensive and will take a great deal of time.
- \* Your project should be done on poster board.
- \* Use only one side of the poster board.
- \* If you do not have materials to complete this project, please see your teacher immediately for assistance.
- \* The school store sells poster board.
- \* You may not use clay or dough. Your island should be flat, please do not make it 3-D.
- \* All labeling should be done in ink (no pencil). You can use pencil and go over it in pen.

### Procedure

#### Stage 1 - Getting Ready

Step 1 >> Decide on a theme for your island. This is due date # 1. Research your topic if necessary, so that you have many words to work with.

Step 2 >> Complete the name chart. This is due date # 2. Be sure to bring it to school on the due date - we will review it in class.

Step 3 >> Design a rough draft of your island on a piece of paper. This is due date # 3. Include and label all the required features and landforms. (See the list on the next page.) <u>Do not</u> include map parts (i.e. grid, index, etc. There is not enough room on the page)

Step 4 >> Get all the materials you will need.

#### Stage 2 - Construction

Step 5 >> Construct your island. We suggest you use the order below and that you draw the landforms and labels with a pencil and then add color or ink. (Your teacher will give you permission to work on each of these parts as we cover the mini lessons for each section. Please do not work ahead.

- 1. Grid
- 2. Title
- 3. Island features and labels
- 4. Compass and Scale of miles
- 5 Key
- 6. Index
- 7. Mileage Chart

Step 6 >> Use the list of requirements as a checklist (make sure you have everything).

Step 7>> Complete the student evaluation. (This paper will be issued closer to the due date.)

Step 8 >> Assist your parent with the parent evaluation. (Issued closer to the due date)

Step 9 >> Practice how you will share your island. When you practice, work on good eye contact with the audience – don't stare at the island! You will receive the requirements for your presentation closer to the end of the project.

## Map Requirements

- · Name, date, class, teacher on the front lower corner.
- Title of the island bold, neat and attractive
- Grid letters across the top and numbers down the side (lines done lightly in pencil).
- Compass rose this is your chance to make a creative 8 point compass
- Scale of miles 1 inch = 10 miles
- · Map key place name and symbol used on the map in alphabetical order.
- · Index minimum of 10 places, must be in alphabetical order
- · Mileage chart minimum of 5 places in alphabetical order.
- DO NOT PUT ANY MAP PARTS ON THE BACK OF THE POSTER BOARD. YOU MUST MAKE SURE ALL MAP PARTS FIT ON THE SAME SIDE.

## Imaginary Island Required Features, Bodies of Water and Landforms

- · Your island needs one capital city and at least 4 other cities.
- · Roads
- · Airport
- · Bank
- · Bridge
- · Restaurant
- · Tourist Attraction
- · Historical Site
- · Hotel
- · School
- · Hospital
- · Post Office

- Archipelago
- · Bay
- · Cape
- · Delta
- Geyser
- · Gulf
- · Isthmus
- · Lake
- Mesa
- · Mountain Range
- · Oasis
- · Peninsula
- · River (with mouth and source)
- Sea
- · Strait
- Tributary

#### Other

- · Make sure your river does not split your island into halves. Remember you need a source and a mouth. You could start it at your mountain and run it to the gulf or bay.
- · You may include up to 5 additional places. Be careful not to saturate your island.
- · Make sure the features can be accessed by the road(s).
