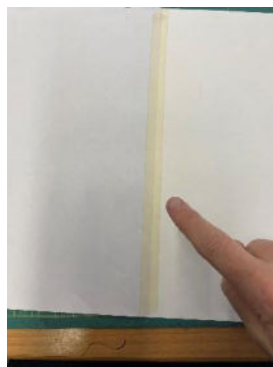




When I printed the animals they came out with a small white border. I decided to use this to glue the

picture to the A4 drawing paper. Ofcourse you can cut the picture to the right size and glue it to a A3.



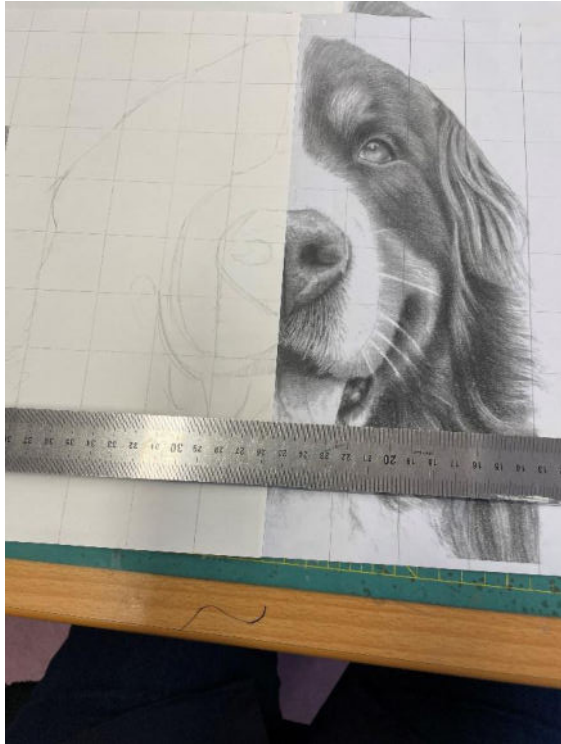
As I said I glued it to a A4 and I put some tape on the back to make it hold better.



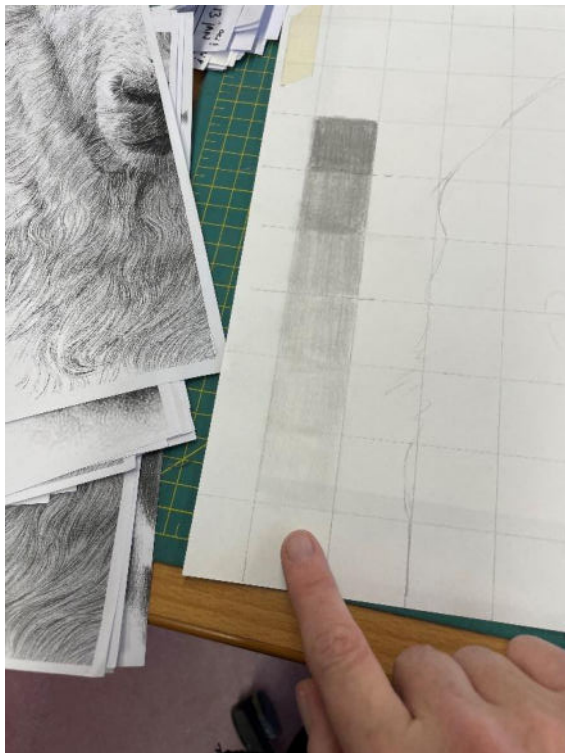
We used the ruler to draw the grid. Starting from the middle (I put the ruler against the rim of the picture so it was straight.) Than going to the side. Each time carefully moving the ruler to work precise and make sure the grid is right. Tell students they have to draw light lines and using HB pencil.



Draw the lines to one side and then also the other half of the page. Than start from the bottom going up.

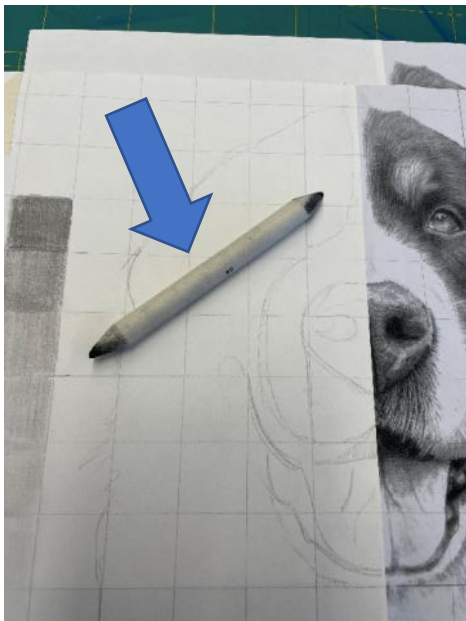
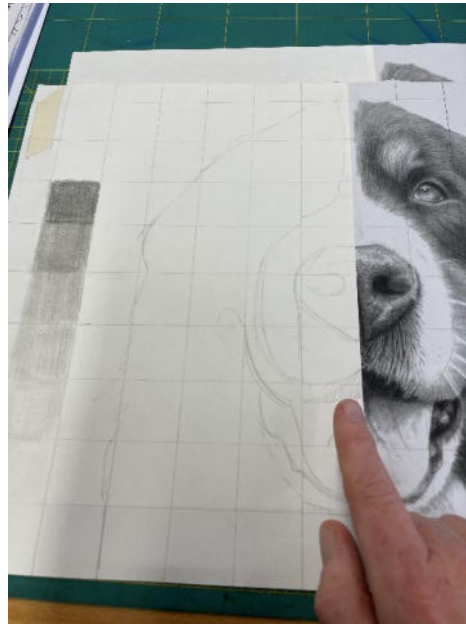


You would need a long ruler so they can draw the lines easily



When the grid is finished, I made them do an extra exercise. They had to look at the different shades in their picture of an animal. Next they had to make a gray scale on both sites. In this way they practiced twice and they could experience the difference in the paper. Copy paper works different than good drawing paper.

Next they started to lightly outline the contour and the important parts of the animal. And after that lightly begin working on the different shades of grey.



They can borrow a blender (is that correct) to make nicer shades. They turn in a shoe or their phone and get it back when the return it. Works great!
