Intermediate Professional Crafts Syllabus

<u>Professional Crafts:</u> Designed as the next course in the professional crafts of Fibers, Basketry, and Metalsmithing. Emphasis will be upon exploring multicultural concepts and techniques, associated with each craft area, in concert with the Essential Standards for Beginning Level Arts Specialization.

Course Components: Beginning Professional Crafts utilizes a standards-based learning and assessment model. The emphasis is upon exploration of standards to achieve learning outcomes that demonstrate mastery of the standards. This method allows for students to explore, experiment, apply, assess their learning, revise/revisit learning outcomes and ultimately articulate their understanding of standard concepts, ideas, techniques, processes etc This method encourages students to embrace mistakes as a part of the learning process that informs and assists in achieving mastery. Components will be In Progress Learning & Final Projects. In Progress Learning will be assessed utilizing single point rubrics (sample single point rubric) that allow students to cite specifically from their learning process. It will reflect a "Developing" status or "Mastery" status. We will utilize the information to inform further instruction and/or movement toward the *Final Project*. Students will need to complete and apply ALL *In Progress Learning* to a Final Project. The *Final Project* will utilize the Single Point Rubric model with assigned point values to the Mastery Level of the Standards. In summary, In Progress Learning will show green completion checkmarks in the Powerschool gradebook and *Final Projects* will have point assessment values. Students will have a digital copy of all single-point rubrics as communication to parents/guardians of learning progress. Please do not hesitate to contact me regarding the standards-based grading method utilized for this course.

<u>Materials Required:</u> Course cost will be \$30.00 to cover materials such as fabric, fabric dye, yarns, basketry materials, copper, and copper wire.

<u>Course Components:</u> Cultural/Historical Context Exploration, Aesthetic Discourse, Creative Processes & Studio, Criticism/Analysis/Evaluation.

Course Component assessments: Learning Objective Exercises, Quizzes, Seminar, Projects, Sketchbook, & Homework

<u>Projects/Homework:</u> Students are expected to complete weekly sketchbook assignments. Students are expected to work on artworks outside of class time if they do not complete during course allotted time. 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Make up work: Students are responsible for inquiring about missed work due to excused absences and will have a reasonable amount of time allotted in order to complete work. Students who do not follow classroom policies on media usage will receive 1 verbal warning and then continued issues will result in the cell phone being taken for the remainder of class and call home to discuss media usage. The cell phone WILL be returned at the end of class. Students may utilize only one earbud while listening to music. No media or earbuds will be utilized during instruction. <u>Objectives:</u> Completion of the Intermediate Professional Crafts course will provide a base for further exploration in Historical and Contemporary traditions of Fiber Arts, Basketry and Metalsmithing. Students will develop an understanding of the Visual Language and Culture as well as the art making process.
