Defining Art Criticism through Formal Analysis

• Art criticism is responding to, interpreting meaning, and making critical judgments about specific works of art through a formal analysis.

- · Critics tend to focus more on modern and contemporary art from cultures close to their own.
- \cdot Art historians tend to study works made in cultures that are more distant in time and space.
- · When initially introduced to art criticism, many people associate negative connotations with the word "criticism."

A professional art critic may be :

- · a newspaper reporter assigned to the art beat,
- \cdot a scholar writing for professional journals or texts, or
- · an artist writing about other artists.

There are four levels to formal analysis

- 1. Description (observation)
- 2. Analysis
- 3. Interpretation
- 4. Judgment

Description = this is a literal description of the artwork.

What do you know?

Who created it? When?

What is the title?

What is the size?

What technique, materials, medium was used to make it?

Description = things that you can observe.

This can lead to some implications, but do your best to stay as literal as possible at this stage.

What do you see?

What seems to be the main **subject matter** and contributing parts to the image?

Use <u>descriptive language</u> to illustrate what you see.

- What is the setting?
- Who is there?
- How would you describe the people, relationships, animals, location, activity?
- What is "going on." "about to happen." or "just happened?"
- What time of day/night is it? Indoor or outdoors? Can you guess what season?

Analysis = How are the elements of are working together?

does your eye move around the image?

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What **Principles of Design** are in use?

• **Emphasis** : What do you notice first when you look at the work(s)? Where is it positioned? Why is your attention drawn there? What are contributing factors?

• **Balance** : What type is shown? How is is being created?

• **Pattern, Rhythm, Movement** : Are elements repeated? How are they helping to organize the design?

What <u>compositional strategies</u> are in use?

What point of view, perspective, angle, and distance is shown?

Interpretation = What does the art make you think or feel? What is the story? What is the <u>content?</u>

- What do you think the artist wants you to notice?
- Do you think there are things in the artwork that represent other things/symbols?

 Why do you think that the artist chose to make the kind of artistic decisions that they did? (materials, process, subject matter, elements).

What style of artwork do you think it is? <u>Possible types.</u>

Judgement = This is your personal evaluation.

What is your opinion and perspective of the artwork?

- What value do you find in the artwork?
 - Examples : Is it a beautiful work of art? Does it make you feel something? Think something? Learn something? Does it convey an important social message? Effects the way you see the world? make insightful connections? reaffirm or question a belief?
- What did this artwork teach you or introduce you to?
- What questions do you have regarding this image?
- What is the best part of this artwork?
- Could anything be improved or elaborated on?
