ARTICLE OF THE WEEK

- Morning work structure
- Current event article that will require daily rereading
- Consistent responsibilities each week
 - Monday- receive article, read it twice, answer who, what, when, where
 - Tuesday- reread and annotate using Think Marks
 - Wednesday- pose questions the article makes you wonder about
 - Thursday- author's purpose and highlight evidence
 - Friday- catch up, double check, Friday question

ACCELERATED READER (AR)

- Quarterly STAR testing to set goals
- 80% accuracy required
- No school-wide nonfiction requirement this year
 - Monitored and rewarded in the classroom
- Book Check Out:
 - 1 nonfiction in-range
 - 1 fiction in-range
 - 1 free choice
- Progress updates will come home for your signature in your child's Communication Folder

ISTATION

- Monthly assessments for all students
- Assesses multiple skill areas including vocabulary and fluency
- 1 more data point that I use in determining a plan for your student
- Individualized practices based on monthly assessment results

Writing

- Students have working writing folders in the classroom
- Completed throughout the entire year

HOW CAN YOU HELP YOUR CHILD AT HOME?

1. Help your child find books they love.
 - a. Fiction or nonfiction?
 - b. Search for similar series/author's styles
2. Talk with your child about the books they're reading.
Ask specific questions.
3. Reward reading with experience rewards, rather than material rewards (ie: Family game night rather than a new toy).
4. Encourage your child to review Social Studies notes each night.
5. Discuss class content with your child, in both ELA and Social Studies.

ASSESSMENTS - READING, MATH, SCIENCE

- Pre & Post Tests: Students will take the same test at the beginning and end of each unit of study.
- These will be entered into Schoolnet.
- All students will track their data and reflect on their progress.
- Change from last year: retesting will not replace non-proficient post test scores.
 - Students who are not proficient in a skill will continue to receive reteaching and practice in small groups.
 - These students will be evaluated on their progress but grades will not be replaced.
- Students will also take 5-6 quizzes per nine weeks in order that their grades truly reflect their mastery.

WHAT CAN I DO TO HELP MY CHILD IN MATH AND SCIENCE?

- Check their Fantastic Five homework each night and help them with problems they don't understand so that they are prepared for the quiz on Friday.
- Review science notes and discuss the topics with your child.
- Help your child study for tests with the study guides that are provided for each unit.
- Always check the planner for assignments and communication from the teachers.

ACCELERATED MATH

- We are using the Accelerated Math program this year.
- There are 108 objectives covered in the 5th grade AM program.
- Our goal is for students to master 100+ objectives this year.
- Students may work on practices and exercises from home.
- A report will come home weekly to update you on your child's progress.

HOW WILL YOUR STUDENT BE GRADED?

- Same test will be given as a pre-test and post-test in both in math and science. These will be administered in SchoolNet.
- Change from last year: retesting will not replace non-proficient post test scores.
 - Students who are not proficient in a skill will continue to receive reteaching and practice in small groups. (Possibly remediation)
 - These students will be assessed on their progress but grades will not be replaced.
- Fantastic Five quiz at the end of the week.
- Science and Math assignments on content will be utilized throughout the nine week period and calculated as classwork grades.
- Homework completion and participation are factored into final grade.
 - Students will begin each 9 weeks with 100% for homework. Each time an assignment is not completed, they will lose 2 points.

HOW CAN I KEEP TRACK OF MY CHILD'S PROGRESS?

- Check the communication folder - look at every paper! Comment if concerned.
- Check your child's grades regularly by going to my.ncedcloud.org and using their log-in information.
 - User name - student ID (on the front of their AR folder)
