  - Bronze.
- Level allows employers to know an applicant has met or exceeded the necessary skills for a percentage of the 16,000 occupations.
- For example, a Gold certificate verifies that an individual has the necessary skills for 93% of occupations.

Counties across the country are riding the wave of a grow-

ing trend of certify-

state-based work-ready initiatives to demonstrate that their counties' workforce has the skills needed by employers (See "Kentucky Counties Work Ready." County News, Dec. 15, 2014). These top-down efforts are initiated and supported by governors and state economic development officials.

Using its Work Keys testing - which includes applied math, reading for information and locating information - ACT evaluates individuals' career readiness for jobs that rely on those skills, which Lyons said ACT research has shown are

required for most "middle-skilled"

jobs. In the aggregate, at the workforce level, economic developers can use credential attainment numbers as a selling point.

## What is on the ACT?

### How many sections are on the ACT?

There are 5 main parts of the ACT.

English Test - 75 Questions - 45 Minutes

Mathematics Test - 60 Questions - 60 Minutes

Reading Test - 40 Questions - 35 Minutes

Science Test - 40 Questions - 35 Minutes

Writing Test - 40 Minutes

Each test covers very specific material.

#### WHY IS IT IMPORTANT TO PREPARE FOR THE ACT?

When students know what to expect, they can set attainable goals.

Knowing how the test is scored helps students set those goals.

#### How is the ACT score calculated?

- A raw score is given on each test.
- Raw Score = The number of questions correct out of the number possible.
- The raw score is converted to a scale score.


## What is important to know about scoring?

- Math, English, Science, and Reading are counted equally.
- Your converted scores are added and divided by 4 to get your composite score.
- If you reach the college readiness benchmark on all sections, your ACT score would be a 21.





After you submit your essay, scoring experts will evaluate and grade it based on the Scoring Rubric. You should receive your score within 24 hours.


