Kindergarten Round Up for students entering Kindergarten in the fall of 2021 is scheduled for January 4 thru January 29, 2021. At this time parents will be asked to complete some informational forms. Forms can be completed by one of the following options:

Completed immunizations and a dental exam are required by law for all students entering Kindergarten. Some of the series of vaccines take six (6) months to complete. Start now to make sure all needed immunizations are completed before your child starts school in the Fall 2021-2022. Students must turn 5 years of age on or before September 15, 2021 to attend Kindergarten.

## **Statewide Voluntary Preschool Programming for Four-Year-Old Children**

For 2021-22, we are expecting to receive state funding to support preschool programming for four-year-old children. Here are some Frequently Asked Questions to help community members gain a better understanding of what this preschool funding means to Monticello.

**Which preschools are partners in the MCSD Program?** Little Panthers Preschool (Shannon Elementary), Mother Goose Preschool (St. Matthew Lutheran Church), and Sacred Heart Preschool (Sacred Heart School).

**How will the funding be used?** There are many assurances (i.e., requirements) that need to be met when using preschool funding. Money will be spent to make sure that these assurances are met. The assurances include (but are not limited to):

- Facility requirements including accessibility and playground guidelines
- Costs associated with teacher and paraprofessional certifications and professional development
- Paying staff costs for required instruction, program operation, home visits, family nights, and parent/teacher conferences
- Supplies and Equipment

**Which children will this funding support?** Funding must be used to support children that turn age four on or before September 15<sup>th</sup>.

**Will my four-year-old receive free preschool?** Mother Goose and Sacred Heart are half day programs and are tuition free. Little Panthers Preschool is a full day program and has a max tuition of \$135.00. Assuming we have moved beyond COVID-19, all three programs run Monday through Thursday.

**Will my four-year-old receive transportation to and from preschool?** The school district may be able to provide free transportation using an existing bus route. Check with your preschool provider for more information.

### **Preschool Registration**

All three programs are currently taking applications for the 2021-22 school year.

**Little Panthers Preschool, Shannon Elementary** – Please see registration information at the bottom of this page.

**Mother Goose Preschool** – Mother Goose Preschool will enroll children for 2021-2022 beginning February 1st. Applications will be available at Mother Goose Preschool. Tuition for three-years-olds is \$100 per month. A Statewide Voluntary Preschool allocation may cover the tuition for children who are four by September 15th. Please call Ann Eby at 319-465-5675 for more information.

**Sacred Heart Preschool, Sacred Heart School** – There are three options for 3-year-old preschool: M & W 8:00-10:50 am, T & TH 8:00 - 10:50 am, or our 4-day program M, T, W, TH. The 4-year-old PreK program has two sections: M-Th 8:00 - 11:00 am and M-Th 12:00 - 3:10 pm. If your child is four years old by Sept. 15, 2021, tuition is paid by State of Iowa Preschool Grant. ### **Little Panthers Preschool**

For 2021-22, we will have openings in the Little Panthers Preschool. If you are interested in registering your 4-year-old, please register your four-year-old in one of the following ways:

### EIGHT TIPS TO GET YOUR KIDS ON A GOOD SLEEP SCHEDULE *(Summarized)*

Getting your kids on a healthy sleep schedule can be hard during the pandemic. Since kids have been out of school and unable to do many of their regular activities, many are off their regular sleep schedule, says Dr. Kelly Chiu, a primary care pediatrician at Boston Children's Primary Care at Martha Eliot. Here are Dr. Chiu's tips for helping kids improve their sleep schedule.

- #1. Set a morning wake up-** She says it's best to maintain the same schedule every day of the week, rather than sleeping in on weekends. "Having a variation in sleep patterns is a problem for a lot of older kids. Being consistent every day is really the key to getting satisfying sleep." Keeping a daily schedule can help kids stay on track.
- #2. Keep a daily schedule-** You don't have to plan every minute of the day. But having some sort of schedule will help keep your kids on track.
- #3. Set regular mealtimes-** Mealtimes are directly related to sleep schedule. "When kids wake up late, most of their eating is done in the later hours of the day," says Dr. Chiu. "If you're used to eating late, you'll end up being hungry at night." She recommends making sure that kids have breakfast and lunch at reasonable times, to move their hunger cycles earlier in the day.
- #4. Monitor and limit screen use-** Dr. Chiu says technology is at the root of a lot of sleep issues. She recommends setting clear rules around technology early and sticking with them.
- #5. Get outside activity-** Encourage your child to spend time outside, whether it's taking a walk, riding a bike, or playing in your backyard or park — just make sure all family members wear a mask and stay at least 6 feet away from others when possible.
- #6. Don't allow naps-** Once your kids have outgrown the need for naps — usually by age 5 — they shouldn't be sleeping during the day. "Naps can be detrimental for good sleep," says Dr. Chiu. "Even a short nap can throw off your child's sleep schedule."
- #7. Create a comfortable sleeping environment-** Your child will find it easier to sleep if their bedroom is a place where they feel comfortable. Dr. Chiu offers these tips:
  - keep the bedroom device-free
  - make sure it's a comfortable temperature for sleeping
  - place a nightlight in the room if it helps your child feel more comfortable
  - create a bedtime routine, such as taking a bath or reading before bed
- #8. Remember that kids are flexible-** "Kids are really resilient and flexible, so don't feel guilty trying to adjust their schedule," says Dr. Chiu. "Try to come up with a schedule that's reasonable, and your child will feel a positive difference."

## Annual Notice—Directory Information

The district may release the following types of directory information to the public without parent or eligible student consent: name, address, telephone number, date and place of birth, e-mail address, grade level, enrollment status, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received, the most recent previous educational agency or institution attended by the student, student ID number that is displayed on a student identification card (provided it cannot be solely used to access the student's educational records), user ID or other unique personal identifier that is displayed on a student identification card (provided it cannot be solely used to access the student's educational records), photograph and other likeness, and other similar information. No directory information may be released without parent or eligible student consent if either the information or the manner of circumstances in which it is released would serve to identify a student as handicapped or receiving special education services.

Any parent or eligible student objecting to the public release of directory information must annually file a written objection with the office of the principal of the school. That information objection shall not be publicly released.
