## STOP...It's the Law

## **School Bus Safety Reminders**

According to safety experts, riding the school bus is the safest form of transportation to and from school, but recent numbers show that Gaston County has the second highest percentage of stop arm violations.

The NC Department of Public Information shows 64.59% of Gaston County's 209 buses are passed illegally in a single day. That's the second highest percentage in the entire state of North Carolina.

Please remember the following regarding school buses:

- When the amber lights on a bus come on, it means the bus is approaching a stop, so drivers should exercise caution;
- When the red lights come on, the bus has stopped and students are getting on that bus or getting off that bus; drivers should stop at that point;
- There are a few exceptions to the rule. For example, if there
  is a divider of some sort, whether it's a ditch or a median that
  is a true divider, that is when drivers do not have to stop;
- However North Carolina law requires that if you're driving on a four lane road without a divider or a two lane road, even with a middle turning lane, you must stop for school buses.
- Also, please remember that this law applies to anytime a school bus is stopped for loading and unloading students, including when they are doing so in front of JCMS in the morning and afternoon.


In Social Studies we are learning about the start of America. We have learned about the colonists and the American Revolution. Mr. Moss has found some fun activities and videos that help us understand the material better.


