Stop The Slide!

You can help prevent summer reading loss! Studies show that a child can lose up to three months of reading achievement over summer vacation. Over time, that could add up to a year's worth of progress by fifth grade. The easiest way to stop the decline is to ensure reading happens.

- The school expectation for your child is to read three books this summer. Help your child meet or even exceed the goal.
- Let your child see you reading newspapers, magazines, books, flyers, recipes, etc.
- In the car, while traveling, listen to audio books. Audio counts!
- Let your child choose reading material that interests them.

Notes from the Nurse

Summer time! Summer time! Summer time fun, brings heat, bugs, and lots of sun!

FOR CLASS TRIPS: WHEN PACKING LUNCHES/SNACKS DON'T FORGET CLASSMATES WITH FOOD ALLERGIES (AVOID NUTS/ FOODS CAUSING ALLERGIES)

- Send water bottles and remind your child to keep hydrated!
- Sun protection Apply sun block at home before school and wear sun protective hats and clothes.
- Apply bug spray OVER clothing and AFTER sun block.
- Tics -- There are tics on the perimeter of school property, ball fields, etc. Please be vigilant about checking for tics daily. Inspect the head, arms and warm areas of the body.
- Flip flops (especially without a heel backing) are the cause of lots of school injuries due to falls, trips, and slips on outdoor equipment! Consider sneakers for school play!

- stNEW MEDICATION ORDERS AND MEDICATION SHOULD BE SENT IN THE BEGINNING OF EACH SCHOOL YEAR. FORMS WILL BE SENT HOME AND CAN BE DOWNLOADED FROM THE NORWOOD PUBLIC SCHOOL WEB SITE.
- *TREATING A CHRONIC HEALTH CONDITION LIKE ASTHMA AND SEVERE ALLERGIES CAN BE EXPENSIVE! CONSIDER GOING TO THE WEBSITE OF YOUR CHILD'S MEDICATION FOR MONEY-SAVING COUPONS.

First Grade is winding down!






SECOND GRADE TRAVELS

Grade 3 students have been really busy during the month of May. All Third Graders were very excited about playing their recorders for the end of year school concert, and did an amazing job at the school-wide performance.

- *In Science, each class completed and presented the earthquake hazard projects. The students did a fantastic job working collaboratively to present information on building safety, landslides, fire and general safety and tsunamis which are all related to earthquake hazards. In addition, Mrs. Lockwood kicked off the month with the animal unit by bringing some small fish to each classroom for the students to observe. The month of May ended with a plant observation experiment in each classroom.
- *In Math, the Third Graders worked very hard to complete the four math PARCC tests. Students also completed Topic 14: Solve Time, Mass, and Capacity Problems, as well as Topic 15, Attributes of Two-Dimensional Shapes during math classes. As always, Third Graders should continue to review the basic addition and subtraction facts, as well as practice the basic multiplication and division facts at home. This should become part of each student's daily routine, even throughout the summer vacation.
- *In Reading, students worked on a variety of independent reading work such as reading comprehension packets and literature circles while the DRA assessments were administered. In writing, students worked on a variety of strategies such as writing poetry, and learning about and using literary devices such as similes and metaphors in their writing.
- *All Third Graders are very excited about the field trip to the Concord Museum on Friday, June 17th. Students are sure to enjoy this very interactive historical field trip!

Fourth Grade Happenings

It's hard to believe that the end of the year is only days away...we have been very busy in fourth grade. In Math the children learned all about Geometry and Measurement and currently are learning all about Algebraic patterns with numbers and objects. We continue to work to enhance our math vocabulary and will soon be taking our End of the Year Math Assessment,

which covers all subject areas taught

this year.

In Language Arts we finished working on reading strategies to help students understand more complex texts. We have begun writing our eight-stanza poem featuring our pet rocks! This poem integrated information learned from our Geology unit, as well as our studies of the United State Regions.

The children were encouraged to

include figurative language and more precise word usage.

In Science we have finished our Geology unit and are currently in our Animal

unit where we are learning about the food web. We were able to witness the life cycle of a Painted Lady Butterfly.

All butterflies hatched and were released in our beautiful garden. We will be comparing the life cycle of a Painted Lady Butterfly to the life cycle of the Luna Moth. On June 7th we will be hosting our annual Chuck a Duck enrichment activity. The children have

been working hard on their catapult projects at home which culminates our forces unit. Please check our website for upcoming videos.

In Social Studies we are completing our units on the United States Regions and exploring Canada. Pretty soon your child will be taking their capital and location test on the entire United States! On May 5 we celebrated the Mexican holiday Cinco de Mayo. The

children learned all about this wonderful holiday while exploring the food and culture of our neighbor to the South. In the library the students worked with Mrs. Higgins on a mini research project on monuments and landmarks found in our nation's capital, Washington, D.C.

In Open Circle we continue to work on social competency skills and problem solving. This was particularly helpful with learning how to manage stressful situations such as the PARCC testing. Thanks to all the parents who sent in their stars with encouraging messages to their children. The children loved them and so did we!

On the last day of school we will be sending home the summer homework packages, report cards, and your child will have the opportunity to meet their new fifth grade teacher. We have enjoyed having your children in our classrooms. Have a safe and happy summer!
