intext: – To search within the FULL TEXT of a webpage, example: intext: "Louis Armstrong was influenced by" (no space after "intext:"). This is also a great way to search for a thesis idea!

allintitle: – Only the page titles are searched not the remaining text on each webpage.


Search newspaper archives

Google has scanned Newspapers back to the 1800s but these newspapers cannot be found with a regular Google search. To find articles from scanned newspapers, go to www.google.com and type in **site:google.com/newspapers**, followed by the search terms you'd like to use. For example, if you're searching for a scanned article on Louis Armstrong, you would type in:



site:google.com/newspapers "Louis Armstrong"

The Deep Web or Invisible Web!

Fact: 85% of web searchers use only search engines to find information.

The Deep Web is content that you can't access through a search engine like Google because it is not indexed on the web.

Databases!

Marvel! A collection of dozens of databases giving full-text access to magazines and newspaper articles. It would cost \$700,000 to purchases all of these databases!
