Figurative Language



- The meaning of a word that goes beyond the literal, dictionary, meaning by representing an idea
- Uses creative language to express an idea
- Helps paint a picture in the reader's mind
- Not to be taken literally! (No actual cats and dogs falling from the sky)



Figurative Language



- Types of figurative language:
- Metaphor
- Simile
- Personification

Types of Figurative Language



- Metaphor: a word or phrase for one thing that is used to refer to another thing in order to show or suggest that they are similar. Example: The snow is a white blanket.
- Simile: a phrase that uses the words like or as to describe someone or something by comparing it with someone or something else that is similar. Example: She was as busy as a bee.

- You are my hat.

Personification



 a type of figurative language in which a nonhuman subject is given human characteristics




- "The leaves waved in the wind"
- The wind whistled all night long"
