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
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Please note: This is only the main event area. There is also a second level where auction items are housed and the live art show will take place.






Entertainment

Cultural Wisdom

Understanding Afro-Caribbean Carnival

Carnival is often viewed by outsiders as a highly risqué spring break event where people dress provocatively and party. Such perceptions are narrow Western views of the celebration. In Williams C. Day's book, Five years' residence in the West Indies, he described Carnival as a "negro masquerade". He rather vividly described the costumes he saw, yet completely failed to comprehend their meaning or purpose.

In truth, Caribbean Carnival is a festival of freedom that was performed in the face of European enslavement. The word "Carnival" has roots in the pre-emancipation ritual of Cannes Brulees (sugarcane burning) that occurred on the massive sugar plantations. At Carnival, symbolic characters are often portrayed through various masks. Every act and item used (including body paint, markings, crowns, feathers, cowrie shells, etc.), carries a specific meaning and is done purposefully.

Mask making is very powerful as it suggests that the maker is "transforming themselves" in efforts to connect with ancestors. The act of mask making and masquerade is an African practice. Engaging in these masking rituals, created a facade for colonizers, making colonizers believe that enslaved people were being obedient and assuming their cultural beliefs. Whereas in reality enslaved people were using a "mask" as a way of representing hope, empowerment, and as a veil to connect with their own culture. Masking was used as a means to empower oneself and the practice still exists in the celebration of Carnival today.

Attire and Etiquette

We want all of our guests to enjoy themselves and embrace this unique cultural experience while respecting the cultural integrity of the Afro-Caribbean Carnival theme. This is a formal event. As such, **all guests are required to:**

- Wear appropriate Black Tie attire
- Refrain from donning carnival style costuming, including head dresses, arm bands, waist plumes, etc.
- Refrain from using face or body paint of any kind

<u>Masks</u>

We encourage the wearing of **creative** and beautiful masks. **The most important note with regard to masks is to wear COLOR and to express YOURSELF** – please do not make an attempt to imitate Afro-Caribbean cultural masks. By using your mask to express *yourself*, you will keep in tune with the traditional meaning of mask wearing during Carnival and honor the culture.

This is NOT a phantom of the opera styled gala, it is Afro-Caribbean Carnival! Masks are a wonderful place for you to embrace the theme. To the right are a few examples of traditional Carnival mask types. **When requested, we are also happy to provide vendors who sell theme appropriate masks.** However add personal touches! That is what Carnival mask wearing is all about!
