#### LAYERED WATERCOLOUR SCAPES

YOU HAVE EXPERIENCE WITH WATERCOLOUR PAINTING

YOU WILL USE DIFFERENT FLOW DISRUPTORS TO CREATE TEXTURE ON YOUR LAYERS

YOU CAN USE A PHOTO FOR INSPIRATION OR CREATE AN IDEA FROM SCRATCH

YOU WILL READ THE RUBRIC/CHECKLIST SO YOU CAN WORK TOWARDS A LEVEL 4

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#### HOW TO

STEP 1: SKETCH OUT A ROUGH DRAFT OF WHAT YOUR PIECE IS GOING TO LOOK LIKE.

**STEP 2:** PAINT YOUR BACKGROUND LAYER. ALLOW IT TO DRY.

STEP 3: DRAW, PAINT AND CUT OUT LAYERS AS NEEDED. ADD LINE WORK.

**STEP 3**: YOUR LAYERS ARE GOING TO NEED TO HAVE BIG PIECES AT THE BACK, WITH SMALLER ONES TO THE FRONT.

**STEP 4:** I MADE LITTLE FOLDED ACCORDION PIECES OF PAPER TO MAKE THE BEES ON MY EXEMPLAR POP OUT FURTHER

**STEP 5**: GLUE INTO PLACE. I USED HOT GLUE TO MAKE SURE THE WATERCOLOUR PAPER LAYERS STUCK TOGETHER AS THE PAPER IS HEAVIER. SOME OF MY STUDENTS USED TAPE.





## MATERIALS

- WATERCOLOUR PAPER MINIMUM 9X12" FOR BACKGROUND, OTHER SIZES FOR LAYERS
- WATERCOLOUR PAINTS, BRUSHES, PENCILS, WATERCOLOUR PENCILS
- SHARPIES, BLACK/WHITE PAINT PENS FOR LINEWORK
- SALT, ALCOHOL, PLASTIC WRAP ETC.
- WATER, PAPER TOWEL, BOARD FOR PAPER
- SCISSORS, EXACTO KNIFE
- GLUE, HOT GLUE GUN, PAINTERS' TAPE

#### RUBRIC
