Nietzsche

Claimed that the loss of God would eventually lead to the loss of any universal perspective on things, and along with it any coherent sense of objective truth.

Nihilism (Nietzsche) and nihilist opposition (Camas) Nietzeche: says "A nihilist is a man who judges that the real world ought not to be, and that the world as it is ought to be does not exist. According to this view, our existence (action, suffering, willing, feeling) has no meaning."

Albert Camas opposed the nihilism viewpoint
