

ECPPS Teachers Earn AIG Certification

Academically/Intellectually Gifted (AIG) teachers are becoming fewer in number in many districts, especially in Northeast North Carolina. The certification requirements necessary to obtain licensure in this area makes it difficult for teachers to add this to their teaching license.

The cost of on-line courses and the distance to attend classes at institutions offering the coursework were both deterrents for educators wanting to add AIG to their teaching license. Barton College is the closest college to our area that has completed the rigorous accreditation process necessary to be able to offer this licensure program. Mrs. Joanne Sanders and Mrs. Dianne McDowell worked closely with Barton to form a partnership to provide this program locally. Thus, the 2014 AIG Cohort began. Mrs. Sanders not only rallied support for ECPPS to host this cohort, but also secured funding to pay for our teachers to take the courses necessary to gain their certification. ECPPS was the host site for the entire northeast region. The first cohort consisted of 16 educators from the northeast region: Nine from ECPPS, four from Dare County Schools, three from Perguimans County Schools.

Congratulations to the following ECPPS teachers for completing this program: LaShekia Brothers (ECMS), Mary Jackson (RRMS), Jennifer James (NHS), Christopher Pinto (ECMS), Jessica Prayer (NES), Angel Swimme (NES), Joni Stuart (NHS), Caren Williams (ECMS), and Lauren Williams (NES). These teachers, along with Joanne Sanders and Dianne McDowell, will be recognized at the Board of Education meeting on January 25th as "Employees Exceeding Excellence."


Time for "Bees" Spelling and Geography Bees



ECPPS BEGINS STRATEGIC PLAN **DEVELOPMENT**
