How to Generate a Thesis Statement

Write a thesis statement

A thesis statement is a sentence (sometimes two) that identifies the focus and purpose for your essay.



Generating a Thesis

■ Brainstorm the topic

The main character in the novel, Stargirl by Jerry Spinelli

■ Narrow the topic

The changes in the character of Stargirl

Generating a Thesis

- Take a position on the topic
- Stargirl changes twice during the course of the novel. First she is an eccentric, free-spirit, later she tries to conform to the behaviors and expectations of her peers, but finally she returns to her true individualistic self.

Generating a Thesis

- Make an assertion based on clearly stated support
- Because Stargirl returns to her original free-spirited personality, she demonstrates her rejection of the phoniness of modern society.

How to Tell a Strong Thesis Sentence from a Weak One



A Strong Thesis Takes a Stand

- WEAK (too vague): The character of Norma in the short story <u>Button Button</u> has both positive and negative traits.
- STRONG and SPECIFIC: Though the dual nature of Norma makes her actions hard to predict, I believe her greedy and materialistic side overpowered her caring and selfless side, resulting in her husband Arthur's death.

A Strong Thesis Expresses One Main Idea

- WEAK: Arthur in <u>Button Button</u> is a moral man, and Norma his wife is amoral.
- STRONG: Since they disagree on many ethical points about the use of the mysterious button box, Arthur demonstrates he is morally superior to his wife Norma in the story <u>Button</u> <u>Button</u>.
- HINT: Many clear and engaging thesis statements contain words like *because*, *since*, *so*, *although*, *unless* and *however*.

A Strong Thesis Statement Is Specific

- WEAK: Arthur and Norma in <u>Button</u> <u>Button</u> are very different.
- Strong: Although Arthur and Norma are a married couple, their differing views of the value of material things and the value of life show they are not compatible.
