Main Idea and Details: Building Understanding ABOUT THIS RESOURCE

This resource is scaffolded, starting easier and getting progressively more difficult. It breaks down main idea in several different ways to help your students develop a really good grasp of topic, main idea, and supporting details.

Each section of this resource addresses a different aspect of main idea that is sometimes confusing for students. For example, one section focuses on helping students distinguish between main idea and details, while another section helps students think about how details should support the main idea.

Each section contains several activities so that students have plenty of opportunities to practice each skill. This also allows for you to easily follow the "I Do, We Do, You Do" model. If you find that students have a good grasp on a certain section, then you can have them move on without completing all of the activities.

This resource also makes it easy for you to differentiate. Students that are really struggling will probably benefit from completing all of the activities, from the very beginning. Students that already have a solid understanding of main idea might benefit more from the sections that focus on how details should support the main idea.

Both fiction and nonfiction texts are included throughout this resource so that students are exposed to both.

Main Idea and Details: Building Understanding

Topic Vs. Details - Grouping Words and Web Graphic Organizers

This section is designed to introduce students to the difference between topic and details. This is an important first step before students can understand the distinction between main idea and supporting details.

First, students will sort words into related groups and decide on a title for each of the groups. Make sure students understand that the title of each of the groups is an example of a topic, while the grouped words are short versions of supporting details.

Then, students will think about topic and details using a familiar web graphic organizer in a variety of ways.

- Students are given the topic and have to come up with supporting details.
- Students are given supporting details and have to come up with the topic.
- Students are given several related words and have to determine which word represents the topic.

Main Idea and Details: Building Understanding Titles Give Clues About the Main Idea

This section is designed to show students how titles and headings are often important clues as to the topic and main idea of a reading passage. Getting students into the habit of thinking about how the title relates to the main idea can help make determining the main idea of a passage easier.

Students will read 4 paragraphs on similar topics. Students must think about the main idea of each paragraph in order to determine an appropriate title for each paragraph. Since the topics are all very similar, students must really consider the main point of each passage in order to determine an appropriate title.

In the first 2 pages, the titles are already provided. In the second 2 pages, students must generate their own titles.

The first 24 task cards have a short paragraph on it, with one sentence that doesn't support the main idea of the paragraph. Students should write the sentence that doesn't support the main idea on their recording sheet.

The last 12 task cards ask students to read a short paragraph, and then come up with their own detail that would support the main idea of that paragraph. They should write this new detail on their recording sheet.

Main Idea and Details: Building Understanding Distinguishing Main Idea From Details

This section is designed to help students to understand the difference between the main idea of a paragraph and its supporting details using scaffolded graphic organizers and short, 1 paragraph texts. This is a skill that students often struggle with. Since both the main idea and details are sometimes stated directly in the text, this requires students to really think about why one sentence might be a main idea and another might be a detail.

First, students will read the paragraph and cut out the 4 sentences provided at the bottom of the page - there is one main idea and 3 details. Students must distinguish between the main idea and details, and then glue the sentences in the appropriate spot on the graphic organizer.

Then, students will read short paragraphs and come up with the main idea and 3 supporting details themselves.





What do you know about wolverines? If you are like most people, then you probably don't know much. You might not have even known that a wolverine is a real animal!

Since most people don't know much about wolverines, they are often mistaken for other animals. One of their many nicknames is

"skunk bear" because they have light stripes similar to a skunk, but they have a stocky body that makes them look like a small bear. If you see a wolverine from a long ways away, you would probably mistake it for a bear cub or a skunk, but wolverines have also been mistaken for marmots, foxes, wolves, badgers, and even porcupines.



If you ever happen to come across a wolverine, stay away! Wolverines are ferocious animals, despite their small size. Wolverines are about the size of a dog, but they will fight animals much larger than them like wolves, caribou, moose, and sometimes even bears. They have long curved claws that help them hold onto prey. Wolverines also have strong teeth and jaws and can crush (and eat) the bones of their prey. Sometimes these ferocious animals even eat the teeth!

Wolverines prefer colder climates, and their bodies are perfectly adapted to survive in the cold. Wolverines have webbed paws that spread out, making it easy for them to walk on top of snow. Their thick fur coat is resistant to frost, keeping wolverines warm even through the coldest of winters. Also, wolverines have a very good sense of smell. This helps them find potential food that has been buried deep beneath the snow.

These "skunk bears" are fascinating, ferocious animals. Although you will probably never see one in the wild, they are still worth knowing about!

Title:	

You've probably measured things in inches, centimeters, feet, meters, and miles – but have you ever measured in smoots? The boys that first used smoots as a unit of measurement were doing it as a prank. They had no idea that some people would still refer to smoots today!

In October of 1958, Oliver Smoot and some friends set out to measure the length of the Harvard Bridge in Boston, Massachusetts. There was only one problem – they didn't have a ruler or any other measurement tool to help them. So, the boys used Oliver Smoot to measure the bridge! Starting at one end of the bridge, Oliver repeatedly stretched out on the ground while his friends marked spots along the way to help keep track. He did this over and

over again until the entire bridge was measured!

Since Oliver Smoot was 5 feet and 7 inches tall when he measured the bridge, one smoot is 5 feet and 7 inches. The boys determined that the length of the bridge was 364.4 smoots – plus or minus one ear. They added the ear to show that their measurements might not have been exact.

Even though measuring in smoots began as a joke, it has had a long-term impact. If you walked across the Harvard Bridge today, you would see markings along the way that would show how far you have walked in smoots. The markings are repainted regularly to keep them from fading. Sometimes policeman reference the markings on this bridge when writing reports. Since so many people in Boston were familiar with a smoot, it was added to The American Heritage Dictionary in 2011, making it an "official" word.

The next time you set out to measure the length of an object, consider measuring in smoots. It won't be as easy as measuring with feet or meters, but it will be more fun!
