School Choice 2022-2023

With current high enrollment numbers, the number of current school choice students, as well as the projected new enrollment numbers for 2022-2023, Dr. Chamberland's recommendation for the number of additional students to be accepted into the Auburn Public Schools via our School Choice option in grades 6-12 is 12. This will keep the total number of school choice students at the same number, 90 accepted students, as the 2021-2022 school year.

FY 23 Budget Review with Finance Committee

On Wednesday, March 9, 2022, Mrs. Wirzbicki and Dr. Chamberland presented the FY23 budget to the Town of Auburn Finance Committee. The Finance Committee voted unanimously to support the FY23 budget as presented which includes a requested increase over the FY 22 budget of 3.15% or \$ 881,673. We thank the Finance Committee, Town Administrator Jacobson and CFO/Assistant Town Administrator Kazanovicz for their support. We will hold our Public Hearing on April 6th, at 6:30PM, at Auburn High School in the auditorium. We will send the final budget to the town for a vote during the Annual Town Meeting on May 3, 2022.

Bryn Mawr Parking Lot

Mr. Fahey and Dr. Chamberland attended the Town of Auburn Planning Board meeting on March 8, 2022 for a second discussion on the plans to create a parking lot and driveway on the field adjacent to Bryn Mawr School. The plan was approved by the Planning Board. I have included the updated plan in your packet that includes the addition of a second gate at the parking lot end of the driveway, a crosswalk on Swanson Road, and parking specific signs in several areas. Mr. Fahey attended a meeting with the Conservation Commission on March 9, 2022 in relation to Phase One of this overall plan that requires changing the location of the school dumpster and creating a concrete pad for the same. This was approved by the Conservation Commission. Phase One, that includes the paving of the current Bryn Mawr driveway and parking lot is on schedule for this summer. Phase Two, which includes the new parking area and driveway in the Bryn Mawr field, will require additional meetings with the Auburn DPW and Town Leadership to identify a funding source.

United States Department of Education - Office of Civil Rights Letter

The U.S. Department of Education, Office for Civil Rights (OCR), has completed its directed investigation and reached a determination in the investigation regarding the Auburn Public School District and potential violations of Section 504 or Title II related to accessibility on our website. The investigation was conducted to ensure the District website appropriately provides its online programs, services, and activities to people with disabilities on a nondiscriminatory basis and to ensure that communications with applicants, members of the public, and companions with disabilities are as effective as its communication with others. Because <u>the District remediated all identified barriers on the tested pages</u> that impeded the ability of people with disabilities to access the District's online programs, services, and activities, OCR determined that <u>there was insufficient evidence</u> that the District violated Section 504 or Title II.

APS/APD School Resource Officer

On March 10, 2023, we were informed by Chief Lemon of the APD that Officer John O'Brien has been named as the School Resource Officer for the Auburn Public Schools. Officer O'Brien will replace Sergeant Brian Kennedy who served as our School Resource Officer for many years. We are pleased to have Officer O'Brien join our team.

The Shared Street Grant

The Shared Street Grant is a State funded grant to improve public health, safe mobility and strengthened commerce in the State. The Town has applied for a Shared Street Grant for \$177,712.00 to replace our Blinkomatic school zone signs and install actuated blinking crosswalk signs, radar speed signs and a LIDAR Scope to measure speed. The grant will also accommodate handicap sidewalk ramp improvements at some of our crosswalks. This grant was spearheaded by Julie Jacobson, Town Manager, Ed Kazanovicz, CFO, Todd Lemon, Provisional Chief of Police and his team, as well as Joanna Paquin, DPW Director and her team and we thank them for their efforts to bring such improvements to the town.

The Green Dome

The Green Dome is a remaining structure from the previous Auburn High School. The Green Dome is located on school property in the outfield of Auburn High School Baseball Field. A committed group of Auburn High School Alumni, most from the Class of 1966, have been working to raise money to update and maintain the Green Dome. Mr. Fahey, Town Manger Jacobson, Assistant Town Manager Kazanovicz and Dr. Chamberland met with 7 members of the group on Tuesday, March 8th. The discussion focused on the process to be followed prior to any repairs taking place and noted that the process must include consultation with the Auburn Conservation Committee and the Auburn School Committee.

Moving Closer to Normal Every Day

Now in our third week back to school with masks being optional for students and staff, Dr. Chamberland shares some of the wonderfully typical happenings at some of the schools. Pakachoag students are participating in the March Madness Reading Challenge where they compare books about kindness and vote on their favorite. Bryn Mawr School has the Discovery Museum conducting hands-on learning experiences for students related to Sound, Light & Laser, and Physical Properties of Matter with adapted experiences for our students with

significant special needs. At Swanson Road Intermediate School, students are focused on reading comprehension and many students are working on hands-on social studies projects. At Auburn Middle School, 7th grade Science classes have been learning about thermal energy and the transfer of heat. Earlier this week, students got to see first hand how heat can transfer via conduction (direct contact). They also saw how energy moves from warmer objects to cooler ones until they reach a thermal equilibrium. Students in the 7th grade also worked on a parachute 'Design and Drop' project.

At Auburn High School, Algebra 1 students are working on solving systems of linear equations or graphing quadratics. Algebra 2 students are solving rational equations, while Geometry students are reviewing concepts for the MCAS exam. Some activities include: Partner worksheets where each person has a different problem but their answers match (so it's self-checking); Whodunnit - they solve math problems to solve a crime; Scavenger Hunts - solve problems posted around the room where the answer to the problem leads them to the next problem.



DESE Mask Mandate

Action

Dr. Chamberland informed the committee, after consulting with medical experts and state health officials, Commissioner Riley will not renew the state mask requirement after it expires on February 28, 2022. Effective Monday, February 28, the DESE mask requirement will be lifted statewide. The Commonwealth's high vaccination rates and widespread availability of COVID-19 testing for school personnel and students support this decision. Any individual who wishes to continue to mask, including those who face higher risk from COVID-19, should be supported in that choice. Dr. Chamberland recommended the district lift the school mask mandate on February 28, 2022 allowing students and staff the ability to choose whether or not to wear a mask. Students will still be required to wear a mask on the bus and in the heath offices. The AEA, Board of Health and school nurses are all in favor. We will continue testing, revise Zippslip, and supply at home tests.

Bryn Mawr Parking Lot Project

Mr. Fahey and Dr. Chamberland attended the Auburn Planning Board Meeting on February 8, 2022 to provide information to the Town regarding the plans for a two phase parking lot project at Bryn Mawr School. Phase One includes the resurfacing of the current parking lot and a minor relocation of the dumpsters to be in compliance with the Conservation Commission request from a meeting held on January 25, 2022, with a follow up meeting scheduled for February 24, 2022 after a site visit. Phase 1 is included in the scheduled work for this summer as noted in the Bryn Mawr CIP Plan. We are also working to include widening the asphalt up to the pine trees for a safer play area for our students if funds allow. Phase Two includes the addition of a parking area at the far end of the Bryn Mawr field and a driveway along the back side of the field that could be utilized for student drop off and pick up for both Bryn Mawr and Swanson Road Intermediate School. Handicap parking spaces as well as sidewalks will be included. Phase 2 is in the exploratory phase to determine feasibility and cost. We continue to work with the Auburn DPW as much as possible. The completion of this project will enhance the safety of our students while also creating a safe handicap parking lot for the whole community to use .

Program of Studies-Changes for 2022-2023 March 16, 2022

Math and English Language Arts

All Freshmen are required to take 3 Trimesters of Math and English Language Arts.

Fine Arts

3-D Sculpture Studio Class

This would be a 3D foundation course, no prerequisites. Students will be introduced and familiarized to the basic principles, processes, and materials of three-dimensional form through a series of projects that encourage experimentation, and conceptual development in the articulation of three-dimensional forms. Students will explore form, space, and structure through the use of design elements such as line, shape, mass, volume, surface, scale, proportion, material and color. Students will experiment with materials and processes, involving constriction, fabrication, casting, reductive and additive sculpture techniques. In this studio-based course students will explore a variety of materials including working paper/ cardboard, metal wire, plaster, plastic and fabric in both independent and group settings.

Unified Learning

Unified Wellness

Unified Wellness is a course that brings together students of all abilities to participate in activities to enhance their wellness. These activities will be a combination of lifetime sports, fitness development, group and personal challenges, as well as overall wellness activities. Students will work together to learn skills and safety involved in all activities while learning modified versions of the game. Students will be given opportunities to build relationships with one another through challenge, self-expression, enjoyment, and communication building.

Unified Digital Media

Students will learn how to handle and operate cameras, produce videos, music videos and photography. Each student in class will create a portfolio to showcase their work. This is a program that encompasses the true Auburn way. Everyone is welcome. We are here to enjoy, explore and create lifelong friendships.

Social Studies:

Historical Research

Historical Research is a unique one-trimester elective course for students in grades 11-12 that is designed to get you thinking, researching, creating and excited about studying various topics of your choosing! Incorporating technology, the internet, and in-depth book research, students will

develop and foster skills in critical research, reading, thinking, note-taking, analysis, and writing. Historical Research will teach students how to find and evaluate sources and consider the importance of multiple perspectives while examining topics of their choosing(which can span all disciplines). Students will learn how to work with resources, working to develop educated arguments and support them with evidence. Keeping an open mind, possessing the willingness to think, and enthusiastically diving into the world of research are necessary habits to be successful in this course. Course expectations include smaller assignments, group participation, class discussions, and a final research project.

BRYT Program

BRYT: Bridge for Resilient Youth in Transition

A unique environment for students to work alongside teachers and clinicians to reintegrate back into school setting after prolonged absence. The program is staffed by an academic liaison and a clinician to ensure a student successfully assimilates back into the general school schedule and demands.

The four components of BRYT:

- Clinical Support
- Academic Case Management
- Care Coordination
- Family Engagement

Enterprise Program:

This is a transitional program that provides a safe and nurturing environment for students who are having difficulty succeeding in the regular education classroom during part or all of the day. Through the promotion of making appropriate choices via self-regulation, self-advocacy, and goal setting , students will become responsible for their academic, social, and emotional wellness with the assistance of program staff to successfully transition into the post-secondary world at the conclusion of their high school experience. This program will help students to:

- Feel connected to a network of building staff and program personnel focused on their needs
- Be included in all activities of the school(with support) to the extent possible
- Make progress on individual treatment goals
- Develop intrapersonal skill to work independently and collaboratively with others
- Have a clinical treatment plan that clearly supports academic, social, and behavioral goals

Clubs and Activities:

First Robotics

This club works in collaboration with students at Sutton High School. Students are tasked with building a robot and competing against other schools. We are excited to announce a great new opportunity for the students of Auburn High School to participate in the FIRST Robotics

Competition. FIRST stands for, "For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology." Dubbed the varsity Sport for the Mind,™ FIRST Robotics Competition (FRC) combines the excitement of sport with the rigors of science and technology. Under strict rules, limited resources, and time limits, teams of students are challenged to raise funds, design a team "brand," hone teamwork skills, and build and program a robot to perform prescribed tasks against a field of competitors. It's as close to "real world" engineering as a student can get. Professional Mentors volunteer their time and talents to guide each team. Robots are built in 6 weeks from a common kit of parts provided by FIRST, and typically weigh up to 150 lbs.

Dear Superintendent Handfield:

The U.S. Department of Education, Office for Civil Rights (OCR), has completed its directed investigation and reached a determination in the above-referenced investigation regarding the Auburn Public School District (the District). Using a preponderance of the evidence standard, OCR's investigation revealed insufficient evidence to support a conclusion that the District violated Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (Section 504) and its implementing regulation at 34 C.F.R. § 104.4, and Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (Title II) and its implementing regulation at 28 C.F.R. part 35.

On May 31, 2019, OCR initiated a directed investigation to determine whether the District's website and online programs exclude qualified people with disabilities from participation in, deny them the benefits of, or otherwise subject them to discrimination under any program or activity, in violation of Section 504 and Title II. In addition, OCR investigated whether the District fails to take appropriate steps to ensure that communications with applicants, participants, members of the public, and companions with disabilities are as effective as its communication with others, in violation of 28 C.F.R. § 35.160(a).

In order for OCR to determine that the District violated the law, OCR must find 1) that there were technological barriers that impeded the ability of people with disabilities to access online programs, services, and activities, and 2) that the District failed to provide equally effective alternative ways for people with disabilities to access the impacted online programs, services, or activities. Not all content and functionality on a district's website implicates the ability of people to access the district's programs, services, or activities. If, during the course of OCR's investigation, the District removes the technological barriers that impeded the ability of people with disabilities to access online programs, services, and activities, and OCR confirms the technological barriers have been removed, further investigation is unnecessary, and OCR will determine that there is insufficient evidence to support a conclusion that the District violated the law.

OCR conducted tests on February 4 and 17, 2022, and March 1, 2022, of the District's website and online programs and determined, as of the initial testing date, that there were barriers to

access for people with disabilities in online programs, services, and activities on some pages, while other pages were barrier-free. The pages selected by OCR for testing included a list of approximately 15 pages representative of the District's overall online programs, services, and activities, focusing on pages of critical importance to students and members of the public. OCR reviewed the District's homepage; different templates; the most highly-trafficked pages; and other pages of importance, as listed below. OCR does not review all of a covered entity's web pages because a website is not static and web pages are always changing. Thus, it is most important for OCR to carefully test those pages that are of critical importance to a student's or member of the public's ability to access a district's programs, services, or activities.

After selecting the specific pages to be tested, OCR applied both automated and manual testing protocols to identify technological barriers to access including checking for appropriate keyboard access and navigation, semantic markup, visual focus indicators, color contrast, video captioning, and document accessibility. When OCR identified a technological barrier to access, it then performed a secondary evaluation to determine whether the technological barrier implicated the District's compliance with the law by impeding the ability of people with disabilities from having an equal opportunity to enjoy the District's online programs, services, or activities.

These are the pages on which all online programs, services, and activities were deemed to be accessible on the date of initial testing, February 4, 2022, although some may have had non-unique template-based barriers to access that were addressed through the pages listed separately, below:

These are the pages on which OCR's initial testing identified technological barriers to access that impeded the ability of people with disabilities from having an equal opportunity to enjoy the District's online programs, services, and activities:

- On the District Homepage (https://www.auburn.k12.ma.us), where keyboard users could not access all features and functions, posing a barrier for individuals who are unable to use a computer mouse; keyboard users could not advance past an element on the page; the page layout, when enlarged to the point of reflow, lost content or functionality, posing a barrier for individuals with low vision; and color contrast was insufficient, posing a barrier for individuals who are blind or have low vision;
- On the Registration page (https://www.auburn.k12.ma.us/students-families/studentregistration), where color alone was used to convey important information, posing a barrier for individuals with low vision;
- On the District Calendar PDF page (https://campussuitestorage.s3.amazonaws.com/prod/1558541/87612908-224d-11e8-88ef-0a5d93e9ef60/2372628/3cfc7580-8913-11ec-9808-02a61867e05b/file/District%20Calendar%202021-2022.pdf), where the PDF document lacked sufficient structure to communicate some content effectively to users, posing a barrier to individuals who use assistive technology; and

On February 8, 2022, OCR held a conference call with the Assistant Superintendent, Director of Technology, and Tech Support Assistant, to inform the District of the barriers and discuss the District's commitment to provide its online programs, services, and activities to people with disabilities on a nondiscriminatory basis and to ensure that communications with applicants,

participants, members of the public, and companions with disabilities are as effective as its communication with others. The District expressed an interest in removing the identified barriers to come into compliance with Section 504 and Title II. OCR conducted a follow-up call with the District on February 18, 2022, to further discuss the remediation of identified barriers.

On February 17, 2022, and March 1, 2022, OCR conducted additional manual and automated testing of the District's website and confirmed the identified barriers had been removed and the District had developed a strategy to remain in compliance with the law, consistent with its expressed commitment. Specifically, OCR confirmed the following:

- On the District Homepage (https://www.auburn.k12.ma.us), where keyboard users were able to access all features and functions; keyboard users could reach all elements; when the page was enlarged to the point of reflow, all content and functionality was preserved; and color contrast was corrected;
- On the Registration page (https://www.auburn.k12.ma.us/students-families/student-registration), where color alone was no longer used to convey important information;
- On the District Calendar page (https://campussuite-storage.s3.amazonaws.com/prod/1558541/87612908-224d-11e8-88ef-0a5d93e9ef60/2372628/3cfc7580-8913-11ec-9808-02a61867e05b/file/District%20Calendar%202021-2022.pdf), where content originally provided in an inaccessible PDF was replaced with an accessible version (https://www.auburn.k12.ma.us/students-families/accessible-district-calendar);
- On the March 2022 Auburn High School Lunch Menu PDF page (https://campussuite-storage.s3.amazonaws.com/prod/1558541/87612908-224d-11e8-88ef-0a5d93e9ef60/2381230/db37dd16-98cc-11ec-8d29-0e2e6b0b80a9/file/March%202022%20AHS%20Lunch%20Menu.pdf), where the PDF document had sufficient structure to communicate its content effectively to individuals who use assistive technology; and
- To the extent the earlier-identified barriers were template-based, the remedies automatically flowed to all pages sharing each such template.

Because the District remediated all identified barriers on the tested pages that impeded the ability of people with disabilities to access the District's online programs, services, and activities, OCR determined that there was insufficient evidence that the District violated Section 504 or Title II.

This concludes OCR's directed investigation and should not be interpreted to address the District's compliance with any other regulatory provision or to address any issues other than those addressed in this letter. This letter sets forth OCR's determination in an individual OCR directed investigation. This letter is not a formal statement of OCR policy and should not be relied upon, cited, or construed as such.






