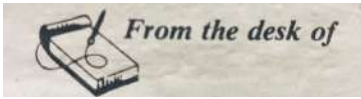

Greetings Freedom Middle School Stakeholders and where did the first six months of school go? Although fast, our 2023-24 school year is off to a great start. Thank you for your support and guidance thus far and as we move forward!

The middle school counseling department is working on a number of items in March to support our students and families.

We will continue our focus on Academic and Career Planning at all grade levels. In these push-in lessons, we work with students to explore careers and the pathways to getting there.

March also continues our fifth to sixth grade transition. To do this, we work with the FES counselors to slowly introduce our fifth graders for their upcoming building change, so they can be productive members of the FMS student body.

We are also continuing work on rapport building with our students, but adding an emphasis on family communication and building relationships with families to support the students at FMS.

With this said, I encourage you to let me know if there are "things" going on at home which may impact your students' day at school. This could be as simple as sending me an email that says "HANDLE WITH CARE - STUDENT NAME." This will alert me that

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News from 6th Grade

6th graders have been investigating “How Does Water Shape Our Earth?” They expanded their knowledge on the water cycle and land-changing processes, such as weathering, erosion, and deposition. They will soon be applying this to their national park project.



In Social Studies we are learning about the history of the Hebrew people. Their struggle to maintain their religious identity while dealing with migrations , invasions, and subjugation by the Romans, was difficult for them to endure. We will examine how the history of the Hebrew people has an impact on their international relations today.

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News from 7th grade

Math

Students recently finished chapter 6 focusing on equations. This was a difficult chapter, and I believe the students will be excited to set aside negatives for a few chapters.

The next chapter we will begin is chapter 7. The focus of this chapter is geometric figures. Students will draw two- and three-dimensional figures. They will also solve problems involving scale drawings of geometric figures.

Social Studies

In 7th grade social studies, the students finished their NHD projects and an excellent evening of exhibits were put on display the 8th of February. We will now begin moving into the events leading up to the Revolutionary War.



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Science

Greetings from 7th Grade Science. As 3rd quarter started, we transitioned into the Earth Science unit of IQWST. The 7th grade curriculum focuses on weather and climate. The major question to try and answer throughout the unit is: “What makes the weather change?”. That question is broken down into the following two sub-questions: What causes a storm? and Why is the weather different from place to place? As we make our way through the labs regarding weather and climate, we are also going to try and keep an eye on the local weather forecasts and relate them to class.

Bird of the month: Horned Lark. This time of year if you are going for a drive down a quiet road, you may notice a small bird sitting on the side eating grit. This bird may be a horned lark, one of our earliest migrants. If you get a close look at it, notice it’s small devil-like horns on each side of the head and black mask. Listen for it’s high pitched twinkling call

ELA

In ELA, the month of March brings work in our Collections textbook. Collections 6, entitled “Guided by a Cause,” introduces students to activism on levels big and small. We will be reading and analyzing a mix of fiction and non-fiction texts between the textbook and the close reader workbook.

We are nearing the end of our Greek Suffix unit. As mid-March approaches, students will review the suffixes and their meanings in class then take a test rather than do a project as we did the previous units.

The independent reading book project in March will look a bit different than it has in previous months. Due to spring break, the book project will not be due until Tuesday, April 2 (end of study hall). However, we know many students will want to have it wrapped up prior to spring break. Therefore, once students complete the reading of their book and the book project prep sheet, they can let their teacher know they are ready for the project. We will then release the project to them in Google Classroom to complete prior to the April 2 due date. If students have not requested the project by Friday, March 22, it will be released to them at that time.

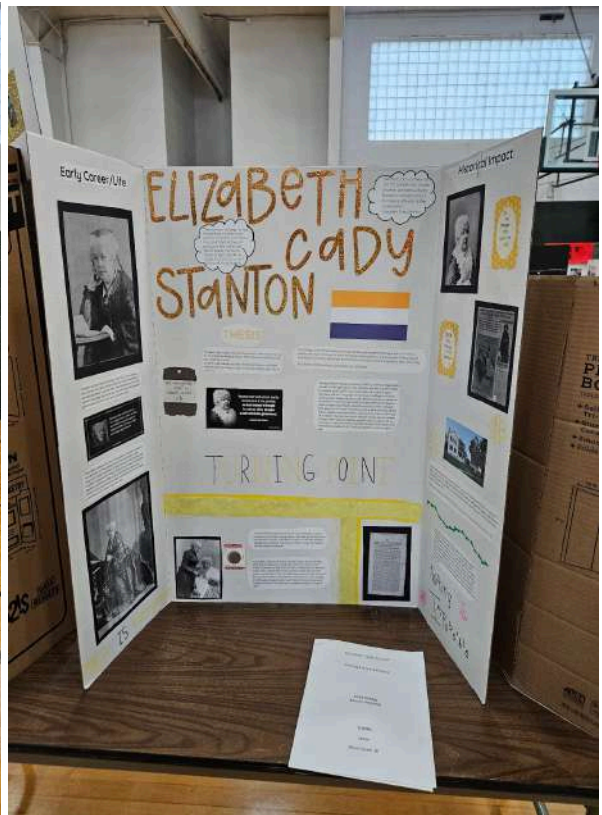
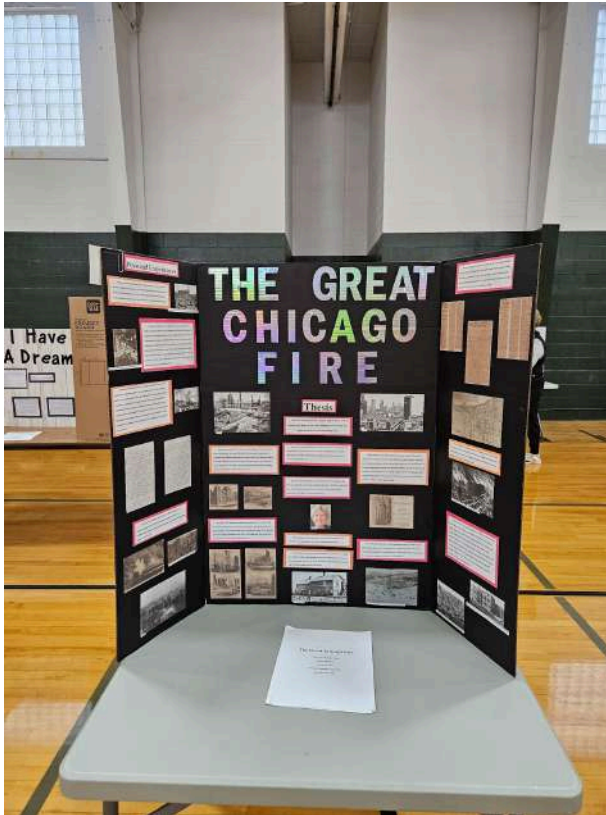

Reminders for the school year-

- If vomiting/diarrhea- your student must be 24 hours vomiting/diarrhea free prior to returning to school/co-curriculars
- Fever of 100.4 or greater, your student will be sent home. Your student must be 24 hours fever free without the use of fever reduction medications prior to returning to school.
- Bring in your emergency medication forms and medications. If a medication is kept on person, a physician must indicate that in the letter/form.
