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Take a Bite with Healthy Teeth

Taking care of your teeth helps prevent plaque, which is a clear film of bacteria that sticks to your teeth.

After you eat, bacteria go crazy over the sugar on your teeth like ants at a picnic. The bacteria break it down into acids that eat away tooth enamel, causing holes called cavities. Plaque also causes gingivitis, which is gum disease that can make your gums red, swollen, and sore. Your gums are those soft pink tissue in your mouth that hold your teeth in place.

If you don't take care of your teeth, cavities and unhealthy gums will make your mouth very sore. Eating meals will be difficult. And you won't feel like smiling so much.

How You Can Keep Your Teeth Healthy You can take charge of your teeth by taking these steps:

- Brush at least twice a day after breakfast and before bedtime. If you can, brush after lunch or after sweet snacks. Brushing properly breaks down plaque.
- Brush all of your teeth, not just the front ones. Spend some time on the teeth along the sides and in the back. Have your dentist show you the best way to brush to get your teeth clean without damaging your gums.
- Take your time while brushing. Spend at least two or three minutes each time you brush. If you're having trouble keeping track of the time, use a timer or play a recording of a song you like to help pass the time.
- Be sure your toothbrush has soft bristles.
 Ask your parents to remind you to get a new toothbrush every three months. Some toothbrushes come with bristles that change color when it's time to change them.

- Ask your dentist if an antibacterial mouth rinse is right for you.
- Learn how to floss your teeth, which is a very important way to keep them healthy. It feels weird the first few times you do it, but pretty soon you'll be a pro. Slip the dental floss between each tooth and along the gumline gently once a day. The floss gets rid of food that's hidden where your toothbrush can't get it, no matter how well you brush.
- You can also brush your tongue to help keep your breath fresh!

It is also important to visit the dentist twice a year. Besides checking for signs of cavities or gum disease, the dentist will help keep your teeth extra clean and can help you learn the best way to brush and floss.

It's not just brushing and flossing that keep your teeth healthy, you also need to be careful about what you eat and drink. Remember, the plaque on your teeth is just waiting for that sugar to arrive. Eat lots of fruits and vegetables and drink water instead of soda. And don't forget to smile!



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Principal by Day, Race Car Driver by Night

Some may not know it, but our very own principal drives race cars as a hobby. Principal Jeremy McKague started racing in 1994 after he received his driver's license. He said he was already at the track because his brothers were racing. He said it looked like fun, so he gave it a try.

McKague races almost exclusively on ½-mile dragstrips, but he will occasionally race on ¼-mile tracks. He drives both door cars and dragsters. The car he drives the most is a 1969 Chevy Nova, and he also often drives a 2015 Camaro Roadster.

McKague says the race season runs from March to November, and he has made over 500 runs in a year before. The fastest he has ever gone is 0 to 188 mph in 7.1 seconds on a quarter-mile track, and 0 to 154 mph in 4.42 seconds on an eighth-mile track. McKague has won several races, which means he had to win six to 10 races in a row. The most he ever won in one day is \$10,000.

While he says he doesn't really have a superstition or a good-luck charm, McKague's

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favorite number is 341. That is his car number, and he will point it out every time he sees it.

On the safety front, McKague's car contains a roll cage, transmission shields, five seat belts, plus many certified parts. He also wears fireproof pants and jacket, helmet, neck brace, and gloves, depending on what car he is driving. He says he has never really been majorly injured. He did crash one time, ending upside down and sliding backwards. He said it wasn't scary because it happened so fast, but when it caught on fire, it got scary really quickly.

McKague says his family other than his brothers who race with him find racing boring! McKague adds, "My advice to someone looking to get into racing is that it is an expensive sport, but that you don't need the fanciest of everything to win."
