II. WHAT TO EXPECT IN SEPTEMBER

All summer reading must be completed by the first day of school.

A Book Club/Literature Circle conversation will take place during the first week of school in September in each English class. Following this, teachers will integrate the required summer reading text(s) into the first marking period of the year. Classroom instruction will require students to use their summer reading text(s) as reference.

Note: All students <u>MUST</u> have a copy—new, used or borrowed—of the required text(s) for use in the classroom and it is <u>HIGHLY RECOMMENDED</u> that notes be taken while reading for use during classroom discussion.

- 1-Excerpts from *The Odyssey*—Robert Fagles (translator); Required Sections: **Books 1, 2, 5, 9, 10, 12, 16, 19, 21-23** Consider the following questions while reading, and take notes so that you will be able to support your main points with examples from the text:
- 1. What purpose does Book 1 serve? What do we learn?
- 2. Discuss the women in *The Odyssey*. What roles do women play and how do you think they represent the women of ancient Greece?
- 3. Discuss the men in *The Odyssey*. What role do they play? Odysseus and his men are seasoned warriors and they've seen much of death and destruction. Why do you think they so often wail, cry, and lament their various misfortunes?
- 4. Why do you suppose the gods do not send Odysseus directly home? What are the gods' motives?
- 5. Discuss the themes of pride and honor. Where do we see these themes displayed? How do these characteristics affect the plot?? Are these traits strengths or weaknesses?
- 6. A major idea in *The Odyssey* is reciprocity: people getting what they deserve. Explain how this affects the main characters: Odysseus, Penelope, Telemachus. What theme do you suppose Homer is presenting through the idea of reciprocity?
