RE: Update on SPS M7 MBTA Pass Program

School Committee Chairman Green and members of the Somerville School Committee, I am pleased to submit the following updates on the M7 MBTA Pass program in Somerville Public Schools.

1. MBTA Pass Program Expansion

During the 21-22 school year, Somerville Public Schools distributed 1,200 MBTA cards to high school students. We are happy to announce that we have launched the expansion of the M7 MBTA Cards for all SPS students in grades 7 to 12 and will be distributing approximately 2,000 M7 MBTA Cards for the 22-23 school year. The M7s are pre-loaded monthly passes for unlimited travel on the subway, local or express buses, and Commuter Rail Zones 1A, 1, and 2 from September through June. Not only will students will be able to travel in and around the City of Somerville to attend school, participate in extracurricular activities, go to appointments or jobs, and access critical resources, the M7 passes also expand students' access to programs and services outside of Somerville.

2. Distribution

Activation of passes began Wednesday, August 30, 2022. Passes were distributed to school administrators and given out to

students during the week of September 5. We anticipate that all 7th-12th grade students in the district will have received their passes by Friday, September 9. Passes will continue to be activated and distributed as needed throughout the school year.

3. SPS Online Update

The M7 MBTA passes help to directly address the transportation barrier that many students face, increasing students' access to opportunities, programs, and services. We appreciate the School Committee's support of this critical resource for our students.

Questions/ Comments

Ms. Dion thanked Mr. Mendez and the district for this huge step toward equity by getting these passes to all middle schoolers and high schoolers.

Ms. Krepchin asked what happens if students do not make use of the pass. Mr. Mendez explained that the district would assess usage after thanksgiving break; if passes are not used at all, they will be deactivated with the possibility of reactivation. If it they are used even once, they will remain active.

Chair Green asked if students who are 12 but still in 6th grade would have access. Mr. Mendez said that S7 Cards are available for those students, but parents will need to preload the S7 cards. This program is specific for grades 7-12.

- **Policing Subcommittee Update**

Chair Green and Dr. Curley shared a brief update.

Dr. Curley announced that the district would be hosting student focus groups on September 20, 2022 and September 27, 2022 and the Special Policing Subcommittee meetings would reconvene at the end of October.

Chair Green added that Ms. Barish would take over the Chairing of the Policing subcommittee this year.

Superintendent Skipper then continued her district report and shared her district notes joined by Dr. Curley and Dr. Boston Davis.

We had an excellent first two weeks of school. Our pre-K and Kindergarten students started last week and have quickly settled into their school routines. Students and staff are energized and ready for the year ahead.

Adda Santos named 2022 MA History Teacher of the Year

Congratulations to Adda Santos, Somerville High School history teacher, for being named the 2022 Massachusetts History Teacher of the Year! The award is presented annually by the Gilder Lehrman Institute of American History and honors one K-12 teacher from each state, the District of Columbia, Dept. of Defense schools, and U.S. Territories. We are proud and excited that Ms. Santos is being recognized for her exceptional work as an educator in our district. Ms. Santos has been a history teacher at SHS for 24 years, and brings an incredible passion to her work, driven by an unwavering commitment to empowering all students through knowledge and self-advocacy.

In 2020, Ms. Santos was awarded The William Spratt Award for Excellence in Teaching Secondary Social Studies from the MA Council for the Social Studies. And, in 2021, she and The Somerville Museum received The American Association of State and Local History Award for the creation of a student-designed and researched exhibit that she and the SHS Local History Club students created called "The Basement Project: Not Your Usual Junk". With this award, Ms. Santos becomes one of 53 finalists for the 2022 **National** History Teacher of the Year Award, which will be announced sometime in October. Congratulations on your well-deserved recognition as the MA History Teacher of the Year, Ms. Santos. We are rooting for you for the National award as well!

Restorative Justice Training

This fall, the SPS Student Services team will be partnering with Suffolk University's Center for Restorative Justice to bring Restorative Justice training to our district. The Center for Restorative Justice's mission is to "foster restorative practices in building just and equitable schools and communities", serving as a bridge through public education, training, technical assistance, research, evaluation, and scholarship. The initial training will involve two-day experiential training for school Deans, Redirect Teachers, and Assistant Principals as early adopters who can begin these practices at their schools as we continue to scale RJ practices across the district. We will be scheduling another round of trainings in the winter. We are excited to be partnering with Suffolk University on this work.

Yearly Student Update Process

Just a reminder to families that the yearly student update process continues through the end of this week. We ask parents and guardians who have not yet updated their students' information to please do so by this Friday to ensure that we have the most current contact and emergency information on file. Information about the process and links in our four target languages to update the students' information online are available on our website. Look for the banner on our district home page. School Family and Community Liaisons are available to assist families who need support in getting online and completing the information.

- File EBC-R: Evacuation Policy

MOTION: There was a motion by Ms. Barish, second by Ms. Dion to approve File EBC-R Evacuation Policy.

File: EBC-R - EVACUATION POLICY

The Somerville School Department will enforce the following Evacuation Plan when it is determined by the Administrator of the building, the Police Department, Fire Department or any other agency in authority that an emergency condition exists in the building or the surrounding neighborhood. During the first week of school, the plan will be sent to parents with a cover letter from the Superintendent. All new registrants through the year should also be given a copy upon admission to the Somerville school system.

This Evacuation Plan shall be included in the Somerville Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan. If the plan needs to be enforced for any reason, the Superintendent's office must be notified immediately. The staff in turn will notify the Police Department, Fire Department and city switchboard operator, to enable them to inform parents if they call, where their children are. It is understood that parental permission is not required before evacuation when it has been deemed appropriate to evacuate. Individual emergency evacuation plans for the disabled will be designed on site as needed.

In terms of disabled students, plans would be adjusted as needed because of temporary situations or new students.

VI. NEW BUSINESS

A. Resolution to Add COVID-19 Vaccine to MA Immunization Requirements for School Entry (Dr. Phillips)

Dr. Phillips read the Resolution to Add COVID-19 to Massachusetts' Immunization Requirements for School Entry

Resolution to Add COVID-19 to Massachusetts' Immunization Requirements for School Entry

Whereas 20,063 Massachusetts residents died of COVID-19 between the start of the Coronavirus pandemic and August 24, 2022.

Whereas the US Centers for Disease Control maintains that "the most important prevention strategies to prioritize in schools include vaccinations for teachers, staff, and eligible students, the use of masks and physical distancing, and screening testing" and recommends that all eligible teachers, staff, and students get vaccinated for COVID-19 before school opens.

Whereas 51%, 79%, and 73% of Massachusetts children and youth aged 5-11, 12-15, and 16-19 respectively were fully vaccinated against COVID-19 as of August 24, 2022, according to the Massachusetts Department of Public Health.

Whereas the state of Massachusetts has established Immunization Requirements for School Entry to "protect students and members of their community from serious vaccine-preventable diseases by ensuring high vaccination rates."

Whereas the Massachusetts Department of Public Health regularly updates these requirements, most recently in advance of the 2020-21 school year.

Whereas it is difficult for municipalities to add additional vaccines to school immunization requirements because there is no legal mechanism for enforcement, and

Whereas 62%, 78%, and 91.5% of Somerville Public Schools students in grades K-6, 7-10, and 11-12 respectively were fully vaccinated against COVID-19 as of September 9, 2022, according to the Somerville Public Schools.

Now, therefore, be it therefore resolved that the Somerville School Committee calls on the Massachusetts Department of Public Health to add the COVID-19 vaccine to the 2022-23

Chair Green proposed a friendly amendment to add be it further resolved to be shared with the Secretary of Education and Secretary of Public Health.

Ms. Barish shared a concern with the mention of the 2022-2023 school year and Superintendent Skipper Suggested a friendly amendment to add beginning with before 2022-223.

Dr. Phillips accepted both friendly amendments.

MOTION: There was a motion by Dr. Phillips, seconded by Chair Green to approve the resolution.
The motion was approved unanimously via roll call vote.
