We have a lot of news to share and and many upcoming events. This week students in grades 3-5 begin Math MCAS on Tuesday.



Asian American and Pacific Islander Heritage Month (AAPI Heritage Month) is an annual celebration that recognizes the historical and cultural contributions of individuals and groups of Asian and Pacific Islander descent to the United States. The AAPI umbrella term includes cultures from the entire Asian continent—including East, Southeast and South Asia—and the Pacific Islands of Melanesia, Micronesia and Polynesia. As of 2019, there were about 22.9 million people of Asian or Pacific Islander descent in the United States. According to the Pew Research Center, AAPI people are a diverse and growing population that make up about 7 percent of the total U.S. population. AAPI Heritage Month 2022 will take place from Sunday, May 1 to Tuesday, May 31.



CINCO DE MAYO

Cinco de Mayo, or the fifth of May, is a holiday that celebrates the date of the Mexican army's May 5, 1862 victory over France at the Battle of Puebla during the Franco-Mexican War. The day, which falls on Friday, May 5 in 2023, is also known as Battle of Puebla Day. While it is a relatively minor holiday in Mexico, in the United States, Cinco de Mayo has evolved into a commemoration of Mexican culture and heritage, particularly in areas with large Mexican-American populations.

School Council Update

The Martha Jones School Council held their last meeting of the school year on Tuesday. Thank you to all of the School Council Members for their participation and support this year. School Council members for the 2022-2023 school year: Caregivers - Suzanne Tessier, Christina Gelsomini, Kevin Schelenski, Rebecca Lowney; Staff - Mary Mundy, Megan Brenk, and Susan Bass.

The meeting provided closure for this school year. A status update of plan goals was presented. The team discussed the return to Hale for the 5th grade, the continuation of the Coding pilot to include 4th & 5th grades (which will continue next year), a discussion of data analysis, a review of Social Emotional Learning including the pilot of Second Step and the curriculum reviews/mapping of Math and Social Studies curricula.

Suggestions from the team included

- Continue to increase opportunities for parent engagement within the school, e.g. Mystery Readers, volunteers in library and classrooms, etc.
- Increase understanding of what is happening in other districts (in terms of technology advancements, specialist offerings) to ensure MJ is competitive
- The need for new AV/Sound system for the cafeteria
- Continue to broaden mini-course offerings through outside vendors

A new School Improvement Plan will be completed next year under the direction of the new principal, Mr. Kuklentz, and the School Council.

Cards and Small Toys

Pokeman/other cards and small toys are not allowed in the lunchroom during lunchtime. If your children choose to bring cards and toys to school, please know it is at their own risk. We cannot be responsible for lost or stolen cards or toys. These issues distract and detract from the educational process. Valuable educator time time cannot be spent solving such matters. Thank you for your understanding. Please review this information with your students.

Water Bottles

It is helpful for students to have their own refillable water bottle, as the days get hotter we like to keep them hydrated. Refillable water stations are available in the cafe and hallway. Please be sure to label your child's water bottle with his/her name. This is true for sweatshirts, coats, etc. The mornings are chilly, but by recess there are coats all over the playground and lost and found fills up quickly. Please label all clothing so it gets back to your child and not donated to charity.

Attire

As it gets warmer, please ensure the students wear appropriate attire to school. Flip flops, in particular, are dangerous on the stairs and are not allowed for running games or climbing the structure. If your student does wear shoes that could prove dangerous at recess, please ensure your child brings sneakers or something safer to change into at that time. We want our students to have fun and not suffer an injury.

Can children be dropped off at a different stop on the way home?

Students may only ride their assigned buses. Transporting students to an alternative, yet existing, stop on the student's same route may be granted if done so on a regular basis (example: three days per week). Requests for alternative stops should be made in writing to Scherie Ciarrocchi, Bus Coordinator and sent to Westwood Public Schools, 220 Nahatan Street, Westwood, MA 02090. **Transporting students for play dates, lessons, or other reasons is not permitted.**


Mental Health Awareness FYI DMH Behavioral Health Help Line

Re: Change in Enrollment Practice

Enrollment in the Westwood Integrated Preschool takes place via an annual lottery of interested families. Starting with the enrollment process for the 2023-2024 school year, the District is changing how the lottery is conducted. Specifically, new families who are enrolling in the Preschool for the fall of 2023 will no longer be guaranteed future slots for siblings. (Families who previously enrolled students in the Preschool with the expectation that siblings will be guaranteed a slot will be "grandfathered.") This change in practice reflects feedback we have received from the community and our desire to create more equitable access for all residents we serve. We understand that decisions about preschool involve many factors and want to make sure that families have this information now to assist with future planning.

News from the Health Office

Spring is quickly approaching and keeping these key tips in mind can be helpful in staying healthy and safe this spring season!

Spring Allergies

Allergies are caused by the body's reaction to substances called "allergens," which trigger the immune system to react to harmless substances as though they were attacking the body. *Allergic rhinitis* is an inflammation of the nasal membranes and eyes caused by certain particles in our environment (like, pollen and molds, or dust mites and animal dander). The symptoms of allergic rhinitis

- Runny nose
- Sneezing
- Itchiness of the eyes, nose and throat
- Headache and fatigue can be symptoms sometimes

How can you minimize exposure to seasonal allergy triggers?

- Wash hands and face when coming inside come from playing outside so pollen is not rubbed in eyes and nose
- Take a shower at night before bedtime to wash off any pollen
- Do not bring items from outside into the bedroom
- . Koon windows in your home and our aload when nearthle

 Check the forecast for pollen levels, and limit outdoor activities when pollen counts are higher

Everyone living in the New England area where ticks are common should perform nightly tick checks during the warm months. Rapid discovery and removal prevents ticks from transmitting diseases. Keep in mind that ticks are very small and love to be in warm dark places like the armpit, groin, around the ear and on the back of the neck.

Wearing a helmet is one of the most important ways to stay safe on a bike!

Bike riding is a great way for families to get some outdoor exercise; however, it's also a leading cause of injuries in children.


What's Happening in Physical Education

The children spent the first few weeks working on a variety of floor skills in the areas of: traveling, balancing and rolling. The second part of the unit focused on the gymnastics equipment structure.


Gymnastics activities are a very important part of every child's experience in physical education. And make a significant contribution to the goals of the curriculum. Gymnastics encompasses a variety of components such as: rolling, balancing, weight transfer and traveling on different body parts and equipment.

Participating in gymnastic activities teaches and promotes important physical values. These activities help develop muscular strength, muscular endurance, flexibility, coordination, as well as gross motor development and body control. The physical demands of holding balances, rolling and traveling contribute to the development of overall physical fitness.

In the Learning Center, the fifth grade students are working on attributes of two and three dimensional shapes. Vocabulary is an essential part of this unit including terms such as: triangle, quadrilateral, acute angle, obtuse angle, right angle, prisms, parallel, perpendicular, symmetry and perfect square. In addition, students are studying formulas for calculating perimeter, area and volume. Students are using both manipulatives and mathematical calculations to determine such measurements. They are beginning to build an understanding of the similarity and differences between square and cubic units.














May All School Meeting




