

MOC – Impact vs. No Impact

You have **limited space** to write on the templates. Yes, there are templates. Make sure your words have meaning. It is not flowery flowing writing; it is technical writing. Like Jack Webb, aka Sgt. Friday, says on Dragnet, “Just the facts.”

Example - Shows Impact:

After using a visual daily picture schedule with check-ins in a total school environment, there was a decrease in inappropriate behaviors and an increase in following directions.

Nonexample - Does not show impact:

Each of the professional growth experiences I have chosen to feature for my maintenance have impacted student performance. However, the degree of impact on my student learners varies. Some of my experiences had an indirect effect on my students but a more direct effect on other learners within the educational environment.

Notice how many character spaces were used in the nonexample, and there is no evidence in those words. What a waste!

While notes are not taken when scoring MOC, everything in your writing should be noteworthy. Look at the rubric, which is based on the standards, and in turn, they are based on the Five Core Principles. That is your focus.
