

Mathletes Problem of the Week #5

The Champernowne Constant

Q: Find the digit in the 1000th decimal place of

$$C_{10} = 0.12345678910111213\dots$$

1st 2nd 3rd 12th 13th



The Champernowne Constant is a number described by mathematician D.G. Champernowne in 1933. It is an irrational number like π and $\sqrt{2}$. It is created by writing a zero and a decimal point and then writing out the whole numbers in order after that (1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11...). It is an interesting number because easy to predict what the next digit will be, but it is difficult to determine what digit will be in a specific position of the number.

- What is the 50th digit after the decimal point in the Champernowne Constant?
- What is the 100th digit after the decimal point?
- What is the 1,000th digit after the decimal point?

(This week's challenge was inspired by YouTuber blackpenredpen who challenged viewers to create a video to show their solution to the above question.)
