Mountain View High School is part of the Bend-La Pine School District. The District serves more than 17,800 students in grades K-12. 
Bend-La Pine School District Organization

The schools are organized on a 5–3–4 plan which means that the elementary schools are grades K–5, the middle schools are 6–8, and the high schools are 9–12. There are eighteen elementary schools, seven middle schools, four comprehensive high schools, and one alternative high school.

Grading System

The majority of classes are weighted equally on a 4.0 scale when computing grade point average. AP courses and certain college credit courses are weighted on a 5.0 scale. Class rank is determined by the accumulative semester grade point average from ninth grade through the most recent semester grading period. Total class enrollment is used in computing the class rank.




Graduation Requirements

Our students are assigned 7 periods through a rotating ABC block schedule. Each period lasts 72 minutes. Students complete .5 credits in 18 weeks and 1.0 credit in 36 weeks. Students must earn a total of 26 credits for an academic diploma and 27 credits for the honors diploma.

Advanced Placement Program

AP CLASSES: English, Biology, Chemistry, Calculus, Physics, Art, Art History, US History, European History, Human Geography, Government, Psychology, Spanish, French, Statistics, Music Theory

These rigorous college level courses prepare our students to meet their higher education ambitions and also provide an opportunity to earn college credit while still in high school.

AP Scholar Awards Program

Students must meet score criteria on several AP exams to qualify as an AP Scholar.

AP International Diploma

Students must designate an exam score be sent to an international university and earn a score of 3 or higher in the required test areas.

Early College Dual Credit Program

COLLEGE TRANSFER COURSES: credits available in Geography, Language Arts, Math, Psychology and Science CAREER TECHNICAL EDUCATION COURSES: credits available in Agriscience, Auto, Business, Criminal Justice, Culinary, Health, Music, Visual Arts, and Woods Students participating in this program have the opportunity to earn up to 109 college credits over 4 years. These credits can be used to meet certificate or degree requirements at many colleges and universities across the country.
