Be sure to use all your close-reading strategies. As you read monitor your thinking and use all clues to comprehend the **setting**, **characters**, **plot**, and **theme** of the story. You will need to use text evidence to make inferences.

For the vocabulary section you need to understand how the **part-of-speech** affects how a word is used.

Review this chart:

Nouns	Person, place, thing, or idea	Hint: Nouns make sense with "a/an" or "the" in front of them
Verb	Action words	Hint: definitions begin with "to;"
		For example, discern = <i>to</i> observe, <i>to</i> recognize
Adjective	Description words (describe nouns)	Hint: Ask yourself – could this describe something?
Adverb	A word which describes an adjective or a verb	Hint: usually ends in -ly

Advice for constructed response questions:

Always **restate** and **answer** the question in your first sentence of your response. Back up your answer with *at least* 2 details from the text. You can include quotes or paraphrase.

In this section of the Mid-Year Assessment you will read an exemplar literary paragraph. You will then identify parts of a paragraph including:

Topic	All literary writing assignments that you do should be given an appropriate title.	Hint: The title should take into consideration the text and the prompt of the assignment.
Sentence	Addresses the PROMPT and also includes TITLE, AUTHOR, and GENRE of the literature	Hint: Use words from the paragraph prompt. Hint: Genre= type of literature (ex: novel, short story, poem)
Background Information	Whatever information your reader needs to know in order to fully understand your first concrete detail.	Hint: You must assume that your audience has never read the text. They will need some background. Hint: Don't summarize the whole text – only what your reader really needs!
Concrete Detail	The best examples from the text that prove the point you're trying to make.	Hint: Can be lines directly from the text (in quotation marks) OR paraphrased examples in your own words
Commentary	Explanation for how the CDs are examples of the PROMPT. In other words, how the details prove your point.	Hint: Even if it seems obvious to you, you still need to say it in a way that makes it obvious to your reader!
Concluding Sentence	Summarize your main ideas in a different way than you already have and remind the reader how it connects back to the PROMPT.	Hint: CS should be similar but not identical to your TS. Think about synonyms that you could use.

One theme of the nove The Cay by Theodore Taylor is that individuals are in control of their own identity (2). The novel's protagonist Phillip is a young boy living in Curacao during WWII (3). He begins the novel under the heavy influence of his mother, a woman who lived in the South during segregated times (4). He notices that his mother was homesick for Virginia where, there weren't as many black people around" (5). Her mindset makes an impact on how he views the world and he begins the novel observing only the differences between himself and the West Indians in Curacao (6). It is not until he meets Timothy, an elderly West Indian sailor, that he begins to form his own opinions (7). He gets to know Timothy as a person, learns a lot from him, and they become real friends (8). Curious, Phillip questions why people look different on the te and Timothy helps him realize that these differences disappear when you look de the person (9). As a result, Timothy reevaluates his previous attitudes and riors and begins to become more mature (10). Phillip abandons the prejudices he

once held and forms his own open-minded identity.

- Propaganda is used to control the citizens of society.
- · Information, independent thought, and freedom are restricted.
- · A figurehead or concept is worshipped by the citizens of the society.
- Citizens are perceived to be under constant surveillance.
- Citizens have a fear of the outside world.
- · Citizens live in a dehumanized state.
- · The natural world is banished and distrusted.
- · Citizens conform to uniform expectations. Individuality and dissent are bad.
- · The society is an illusion of a perfect utopian world.
