- 1. Autobiographies often include the author's feelings and ideas about events. Cite three passages that show Douglass's reaction to his master's treatment of Aunt Hester.
- 2. What set the Lloyd plantation apart from the surrounding farms?

Chapter 4-6:

- 3. In the cultural context of the South, the murder of a slave was of little consequence. Cite an incident from Chapter 4 that reflects this reality.
- 4. How, according to Douglass, did going to Baltimore change his life?
- 5. Write one or two paragraphs comparing and contrasting the treatment of slaves in the

Chapter 7-9:

- 6. Douglass taught himself to write the letters *A*, *F*, *L*, and *S* by watching the ship carpenters. How did he learn to write the rest of the alphabet?
- 7. What was Douglass's biggest regret when he was taken away from Master Hugh and sent to live with Master Thomas? Why?
- 8. Write a paragraph describing the effects of slave ownership on Mrs. Auld.

Chapter 10-11 (appendix):

- 9. Cite one or more images from the text that reveal Covey's snake-like cunning and omnipresence.
- 10. What does Douglass feel was the turning point in his life as a slave?
- 11. Explain why Douglass did not write a detailed account of his escape.
- 12. In two or three paragraphs, identify and evaluate the author's message in this narrative.

Enrichment:

Write an imaginary letter from Douglass to his former master Hugh Auld. In it, outline Douglass's grievances against Auld and his family for robbing him of his right to freedom.
