The primary program goals remain to provide cultural awareness, Native cultural identity, and a sense of belonging to engage students in school. The Indian Education Program provides service to both Fargo Public Schools and West Fargo Public Schools.

This year, nearly 1,100 students, representing more than 30 distinct tribes are served by the Fargo and West Fargo Public School Districts.

I have worked for the Indian Education Program for 17 years and currently am the Program Assistant and Home/School Liaison for grades K-12 supporting students and families. I have three children who are 23, 22, and 19 years old. They have grown into amazing adults of whom I am



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very proud. I am currently a Junior at UND going to college full-time working toward my Social Work degree with a minor in Psychology. This year has been great as I received two awards, one being the Gladys Ray award (which is a great honor), and the other was the DSP (Direct Support Professional) of the Year award in the state of North Dakota for working with individuals at Red River Human Service Foundation. #### **MENTOR PROGRAM**

The Indian Education Mentoring Program provides Native American role models that connect with Native students on goal setting, problem solving, and positive decision making. Tawny Davis and Kansas Ree have access to PowerSchool, so they are also able to access school attendance and academics.

The Indian Education Secondary Mentors' primary role is working directly with the students in the school building and connecting with staff within the school as needed for each student she serves. Please remember to use these mentors as a resource for your Native American students.

#### LIAISON SUPPORT: HELPING WITH CRITICAL NEEDS

- We provide support for elementary and secondary students with a focus on school attendance and academics.
- We continue to serve as a bridge for our Native students and families who have significant barriers both inside and outside of school through home visits, school meetings, and consistent phone calls.
- Our staff provides additional support beyond school for students and families by connecting them with medical appointments, phone calls home, home visits, food baskets, clothing referrals, attendance and/or behavior concerns, etc.



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## **INDIAN EDUCATION PROGRAM SERVICES**

- School supplies provided to all Native students including a massive beginning of year school supply drive followed by offered school supplies offered all year as needed.
- Monthly cultural events: Back to School Night, Indigenous Peoples Day, Winter Gathering, Youth Leadership Day, Reading Events, Graduation Picnic, and more.

- Monthly Parent Committee Meetings
- Cultural presentations
