## Are you a creative teen in grades 7-12 who has experienced personal loss?

The New York Life Award offers scholarships to students whose creative works explore personal grief, loss, and bereavement.

National Award: \$1.000 State Award: \$500

**Who**: All students in grades 7–12 (ages 13 and up) are eligible to participate.

What: This award is part of the Scholastic Art & Writing Awards, the nation's longest-running and most prestigious recognition program for creative teens. The Awards encourage, publish, and grant scholarships to creative teens.

There are six national awards, and additional state scholarships are available to two students from each of the following states: Michigan, Mississippi, Montana, New Jersey, and New Mexico.

**Why**: Sharing your story can provide you with an outlet for expression and can support others who are grieving.

If you create any type of visual art or writing, we have a category for your submission!

Submissions open on September 12, 2019. Regional deadlines vary, and can be as early as December 1, 2019.

- 1. Create your work that addresses the required theme—be sure to check out the guidelines. artandwriting.org/nylife
- 2. Prepare a statement on how your work explores this theme, in 50 words or more.
- 3. Complete the application online by your regional deadline.
