


LOCAL COMMUNITY INVITED

~ From the Desk of the Superintendent ~

Please review our expectations for riding on school transportation during the winter months. We are still requiring students to wear masks and practice proper social distancing when possible. Please send students to school with hats and gloves while making sure that pants are worn, and open-toe shoes are not allowed to be worn to school when the snow falls.

The Sun River Valley School District would like to remind the community-at-large of the importance of winter safety for both student drivers and students who ride the bus. As the cold weather approaches, please be sure that students dress appropriately for school, recess and extracurricular activities.

Elementary students need to be prepared for various types of weather during recess. In the event a bus should happen to break down, sandals and open-toed shoes are not appropriate in winter weather.

Parents, encourage student drivers to take the bus home on days when there is an early dismissal from school. Oftentimes, inexperienced drivers are safer taking the bus. Their cars can be picked up from the school parking lot when it is safe to drive. Parents, please discuss the following with their children:

- Dress appropriately for cold, icy weather.
- Allow extra time to get to your bus stop.
- Stand away from where the bus stops. Buses need extra room when there is ice and snow on the roadway.
- Use the handrails when boarding or exiting the bus to prevent slipping.
- Do not stand or play on snow piles at the bus stop.
- Do not throw snowballs at the bus or at anyone.
- Never try to retrieve an item that falls around or underneath the bus. Instead, always report such an incident to the bus driver.

 Remind student drivers in your house to keep windshields and roofs clear of snow and ice.

Additional tips for a safe ride:

 While school buses are, by far, the safest way for students to travel, children need to do their part to stay alert and aware of their surroundings to prevent injury. NSC urges parents to teach their children the following safety rules for getting on and off the bus, and for exercising good behavior while riding:

Getting on the Bus:

When waiting for the bus, stay away from traffic and avoid roughhousing or other behavior that can lead to carelessness

- Do not stray onto the street, alleys or private property
- Line up away from the street or road as the bus approaches
- Wait until the bus has stopped and the door opens before approaching the bus
- Use the handrail when boarding

October -November

Behavior on the Bus:

- Don't speak loudly or make loud noises that could distract the driver
- Stay in your seat •
- Don't put your head, arms or hands out the window •
- Keep aisles clear of books and bags
- Get your belongings together before reaching your stop
- Wait for the bus to stop completely before getting up from your seat •

Getting Off the Bus:

- Use the handrail when exiting
- If you have to cross in front of the bus, first walk at least 10 feet ahead until you can see the driver
- Make sure the driver can see you
- Wait for a signal from the driver before crossing •
- When the driver signals, look left, right, then left again. Walk across the road and keep an eye out for sudden • traffic changes
- If your vision is blocked, move to an area where you can see other drivers and they can see you
- Do not cross the center line of the road until the driver signals it is safe
- Stay away from the rear wheels of the bus at all times

MAPS & ISIP Literacy Testing (Round 1) Complete

Students in grades sixth through tenth grade complete MAP, or the Measure of Academic Progress, is a computerized adaptive test which helps teachers, parents, and administrators improve learning for all students and make informed decisions to promote a child's academic growth. MAP is used to measure a student's progress or growth in school. The testing information is important to teachers because it indicates what student's strengths are and help that is needed in any specific areas. Teachers can use this information to help them guide instruction in the classroom. If you have ever used a growth chart in your home to show how much your child has grown from one year to the next, it will help you understand the scale MAP uses to measure your child's academic progress. The measurement system is called the RIT scale (Rasch unIT), and is an equal-interval scale much like feet and inches on a yardstick. The scale is used to chart your child's academic growth from year to year. RIT scores typically start at the 140 to 190 level in third grade and progress to the 240 to 300 level by high school.

Simms FFA has seen National Success. We had 5 Agriscience fair projects enter at the national level. Two projects were determined to not have a strong enough agricultural tie. The other three projects received Bronze national placings in the Agriscience Fair. Congratulations to Hudson Rohrer in Environmental Science, Macy Herman and Baylee Herman in Power Structures and Technology in a junior high and intermediate level category. Randi Hart will be awarded her American FFA Degree. She will be the first Simms FFA member to receive this highest degree offered by the National FFA since the recharter in 2011.

Simms FFA traveled to Fort Shaw Elementary School on Thursday, September 10, to celebrate National Read A Book Day. The high school students read the book "Torgy the Tractor," written by Linda Boatman. They followed up the reading with an activity in each classroom. First and second grade did a coloring activity, "T is for Tractor." Third through fifth grade did a tractor safety activity.

The chapter is raffling off a pig to raise money for student travel for the upcoming year. The pig is being processed by Missoula FFA at their Meat Science Center. There will be winners drawn at the Homecoming Football Game for 1/2 a hog, and two 1/4 hog prizes. Along with the Homecoming festivities, the Simms FFA will be hosting a BBQ lunch on Saturday for students, staff, and parents.

Statewide leadership events will be looking different this fall. District Leadership Conference will be held virtually. The District Greenhand workshop will be physical boxes of workshop materials sent to each chapter and then rotated around the District. Several of the Career Development Conference activities will be offered virtually, as will National FFA Convention be virtual. This will change how the events are conducted but will allow larger participation for each local chapter.

Thank you to the Simms Volunteer Fire Department for helping certify our students in Fire extinguisher use. Volunteers from the Fire Department helped the kids use extinguishers to put out diesel fires. We certified 29 students through the http://www.fireextinguishertraining.com website.

In the Classroom, students are working hard. The Ag Mechanics students constructed some sanitation stations using PVC pipe and concrete. They are now working to organize and build shelving in the upstairs storage area. The Ag II students are studying range science and working with native grasses and noxious weeds. The Woods students have built door stops to use throughout the school. Woods II is working to finish the dog houses that were abandoned when school went virtual last spring.
