OPEN EDUCATIONAL RESOURCES GRANT RENEWAL:

Adaptation, Implementation, and Development Phase 2

SYNOPSIS OF PROGRAM:

Open Educational Resources (OER) are teaching and learning materials that reside in the public domain or have been released under an open license. These resources may be used free of charge, distributed without restriction, and modified without permission.

As a part of a <u>legislative mandate</u> to identify and develop a library of openly licensed courseware aligned with the <u>Common Core State Standards</u> (CCSS), the Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) conducted a review of OER targeting secondary math and ELA. Results may be found <u>here</u>.

As a follow up to this report, OSPI solicited competitive grant proposals from districts interested in working to adapt materials based on reviewer feedback and/or implement these materials in the classroom. Funded projects began on Phase 1 OER projects in their schools or districts in one or more of the following areas:

OER ADAPTATION projects build on existing openly licensed works. Collaborative teams from school districts or Educational Service Districts may identify an existing OER for adaptation and work to bring it into closer alignment with the instructional shifts present in the Common Core State Standards. Projects must be informed by the criteria on the <u>evaluation rubrics</u> used in the OSPI OER review process. Projects outside of mathematics and ELA will be considered but are not a priority.

OER IMPLEMENTATION projects support the usage of OER in the classroom. Projects may include professional development targeted at using a specific open resource or suite of related resources or may include classroom pilots of an openly licensed unit/portion of an open textbook. In some cases, modest technology purchases supporting implementation may be justified. In all cases, metrics for evaluating successful OER implementation and impact must be provided.

OER DEVELOPMENT projects are intended to encourage development of new OER, specifically in areas that do not currently have many OER options. Evidence of high need areas must be provided. These OER could feed into future OSPI reviews. Plans for material evaluation based on rubrics used in the OSPI OER review process and anticipated testing strategies should be included.

This Request for Proposals is being distributed to Phase 1 grantees who will be continuing their efforts in 2014-2015. Renewal requests will be evaluated based on actual deliverables accomplished in Phase 1 of the grants and anticipated efforts and deliverables in Phase 2.
