

What: 2/14 Red Scavenger Hunt Photo Shoot

Why: A fun photo shoot to show your photography skills and knowledge of Composition and Elements of Art.

How: First, view the lesson to learn about <u>Composition</u>. Then create <u>14</u> <u>different photos</u> of 14 different red items using at least 2 composition techniques in 2 of your photos. Make <u>2 variations</u> of each photo. Can be cell phone or DSLR. All photos must show correct exposure and focus, have a focal point, and <u>fill the frame</u>. Post your photos directly to Google Classroom, not in slides. <u>Name your photos</u> and include the name of the composition technique it shows.

<u>DO:</u>

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- Create a minimum of 14 different photos of 14 different red items. (Not just a cropped version of one photo.)
- Fill the Frame!
- Use bright light.
- Use clean background.
- Focus the camera on item.
- Use correct exposure.
- Show creativity. Make it saleable.
- Use and identify 2 composition

What is a variation? Example: 5 variations of one









<u>Rubric</u>

- Anything less than C = NC
- 14 photos of 14 <u>different items</u>, with 2 <u>variations</u> of each concept, with correct exposure and focus, fills the frame = **C**
- C and use and identify two <u>composition techniques</u> in in 2 photos = **B**
- B and Show effort, <u>creativity, interesting lighting</u> and composition = A

Instructions/Requirements:

You have until February 14 to turn in your photos. Must be posted on 2/14!

You can make photos in the classroom, outside on school campus, or elsewhere after school. Don't photograph a flat picture, painting or wall.

Be creative, use the studio lights.

Do not show the classroom in your photos. Use paper to form a background
