

Review space for club programming at each school



Operational Structure

- School-based programming serving students in grades PK-6 in every PK-8 school in the district
- Site Directors and Asst. Directors provide oversight and support at respective site
- Wraparound support services through a Clinical Consultant and a Student Services
 Coordinator
- Program staff includes Lead Teachers, Asst. Teachers, Student Interns/Assistants
- Most staff are part-time who also work as educators, paraprofessionals or in other fields
- Community partners supplement programming, offering more specialized activities
- Goal to maintain staff-to-student ratio is: 1:10 for PK and 1:13 for K-6

Registration Process

- Registration takes place in March. Enrollment is done after school placement is announced. PK and K are in different classrooms from grade 1 and up so it does not impact space for older grades. Confirmation of enrollment is done in late April/early May. Weighted enrollment process.
- Office staff and site directors are multilingual, offer registration support, and assist families with questions or technical issues
- Returning and financially challenged families receive placement priority
- Number of seats available based on staffing predictions
- Spring is early to adequately predict staffing; families may be waitlisted as staffing efforts continue
- Placements continue through fall to accommodate as many families as possible

Registration Process

Over the last several years we have been working to shift away from "first come first served" using a weighted enrollment system to be a more equitable and transparent for families. The weighted system mostly affects new PK and new K families; returning K-5 students are prioritized when they re-enroll. When assigning new families to our program, we gather as much info about their needs as possible to better inform placement.

Factors taken into consideration include but are not limited to:

- Returning families
- Single or two parent household working full time
- Multilingual learners
- Families that have subsidized child care voucher
- Referrals from the Department of Children and Families (DCF)
- Income level
