Classrooms Transformed Through **Universal Design for Learning**

When students return to school on September 3, they'll find classrooms throughout the district transformed using the principles of Universal Design for Learning (UDL).

UDL is a framework for teaching and learning that is based on science. It is an intentional design approach that maximizes learning for all students.

As part of a comprehensive professional development plan, a group of Fraser teachers took a deep dive into learning more about UDL during the 2018-2019 school year. Teachers learned many ways to enhance the learning experience for students with a focus on Classroom and Environmental Design, Cultural Responsiveness, and Executive Function.

"We acknowledge that there is learner variability in each classroom," said Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum and Instruction Dr. Donna Anderson. "The UDL principles help teachers be very intentional with not only their space design, but also the way they design their instruction, lessons and assessments."

One visible transformation includes new flexible furniture that is designed to engage

and motivate while students become expert learners. The classrooms can be found in all six elementary schools and Richards Middle School and represent each grade level. For example, 5th-grade classrooms at Disney Elementary and kindergarten classrooms at Eisenhower Elementary were redesigned.


Teachers played a large role in choosing how to redesign their classrooms and worked with the grade above and below them to ensure consistency. The goal is for a cohort of teachers to receive the deeper level of UDL training each year, and ultimately redesign all classrooms in our district.

"The feedback we have received from our first cohort of teachers is extremely positive, and we are looking forward to the next group to go through the training," said Dr. Anderson. "We are listening to all voices throughout this process."

We are so excited for the start of this school year. I hope everyone had a relaxing and enjoyable summer and is ready to return to school refreshed and renewed for the year ahead.


This summer was a busy one here in Fraser. We completed many projects to improve our facilities, including updating the parking lots and playgrounds at the Dooley

FIND YOUR CHILD'S BUS STOP ONLINE

Bus stop information will be available online for the 2019–2020 school year starting August 26. You can access your child's bus stop information by visiting www.fraser.k12.mi.us. Click on the "Bus Stops" link and enter your address to retrieve your child's bus stop information. It is very important to check your child's bus stop, as routes have been modified for the 2019–2020 school year.

Students will be assigned a route number in lieu of a bus number. The route number is located on the left side of the entry door. To ensure transportation, all students must be at their bus stop 10 minutes prior to the bus' scheduled arrival time. Please review with your child the bus rules found on the Transportation Department's website.

The center of the Portrait represents the handshake that each student receives as he or she walks across the stage and is declared a Fraser graduate. Surrounding the handshake are the six qualities that Fraser stakeholders believe exemplify success: critical thinking, communication, creativity, character, collaboration and citizenship. These are skills that must be taught from the start — beginning in preschool and kindergarten — and incorporated into lessons, projects and the learning environment as students progress through school.

My focus remains on creating a culture and climate for learning, where students are engaged and motivated. Last year, throughout the district, we focused professional development around Universal Design for Learning (UDL). A cohort of 40 teachers and administrators took a deep dive into this work, and those teachers, representing grade bands at every elementary school and Richards Middle School, used the UDL principles to redesign their classrooms to better reach students. Check out the story on Page 1 for more details about UDL and the improvements coming to our learning environments.

I look forward to seeing the positive impact this work will have on teaching and learning during the year ahead. We have worked hard to prepare for your child's return to Fraser Schools. BUS SAFETY AND SECURITY UPGRADES

Fraser Public Schools continuously reviews its security procedures in order to provide a safe learning environment for all students. Beginning this fall, all students at Richards Middle School and Fraser High School will need a student ID to scan on and off the bus.

Last year, we began a partnership with a company called Synovia in order to increase the safety and security on our school buses. The program provides many benefits, including documented student ridership, real-time lists of riders, turn-by-turn navigation, digital inspections and remote diagnostics for our transportation department. It also ensures that students are on the correct bus. In the future, parents will be able to receive text messages with the exact time the bus will be at the stop, as well as when their students get on and off the bus through the Here Comes the Bus app.

WHEN DOES THIS TAKE EFFECT?

Beginning the first day of school, September 3, all students in grades 7–12 will be expected to use their student IDs to scan on and off the bus.

WHEN WILL MIDDLE AND HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS RECEIVE THEIR IDS?

Students in middle and high school have their pictures taken and receive their IDs at orientation in late August. Specific information about dates and times can be found on **Page 3** in this newsletter. It is important that all students attend orientation.

WHAT IF MY STUDENT LOSES/FORGETS THEIR ID?

Students are expected to scan their IDs when they get on and off the bus both before and after school. If a student loses their ID, they will need to have a new one made in the media center. Please note this may incur a \$3 fee.

DOES THIS AFFECT ELEMENTARY STUDENTS?

At this time, elementary students will not be required to scan on and off the bus. We anticipate issuing student ID cards to students in grades DK–6 this fall and begin the testing phase in December. More information will be sent to parents once the school year begins.

FRASER DIFFERENCE BOND UPDATE

As soon as school was dismissed in June, construction crews took over at Edison, Emerson and Salk elementary schools and the Dooley Center.

The buildings received updates outlined in the 2017 Fraser Difference bond. Parking lots, curbs and sidewalks were replaced or resurfaced as necessary, as well as asphalt play surfaces. New playground equipment was also installed at all four schools. Inside, a sound-absorbing ceiling and air conditioning was installed in the gymnasiums and classroom coat cubbies and countertops were replaced. Finally, Salk Elementary received a new roof.

In addition to the construction projects, there were also technology and furniture updates throughout the district. All of the Apple TVs in the district were replaced. These devices allow students and teachers to project their iPad or MacBook screens on a nearby TV or Promethean Smart Panel to share, collaborate and complete group work.

About \$2 million of bond money was earmarked for furniture. During the 2018–2019 school year, a cohort of 24 teachers in kindergarten through 8th grade received additional professional development on Universal Design for Learning (UDL). In June 2019, the Board of Education awarded bids to purchase innovative and flexible furniture for these classrooms. You can read more about UDL and the furniture on Page 1.

After this summer, the only major project left from the 2017 bond is the replacement of the football field at Fraser High School. This is the 14th season for the field, and it will be replaced during the 2020–2021 school year.



Students Benefiting from Marshall Plan for Talent Grant

Fraser Public Schools is committed to preparing students for the next step after graduation, whether that is college or career. Last year, Fraser was one of three districts awarded a \$1.5 million grant through the Marshall Plan for Talent. Together with Center Line Public Schools and Armada Area Schools, the grant is designed to prepare students for careers in in-demand fields.



CAREER NAVIGATORS

The three districts worked together to hire career navigators that will bridge the gap between the schools and local industries. Beginning in September, the navigators will rotate through the three districts during the week. Each navigator has a focus area — health science; business, management, marketing and technology; and engineering/manufacturing and industrial technology.

They will help school counselors and students prepare educational development plans, identify and place students in workbased learning experiences, and help develop talent transcripts and portfolios for students.

The five-year positions will also promote the goals of quality career development in kindergarten through 12th grade.

CAMP SCRUBS

Fraser, Armada and Center Line schools also worked with Macomb Community College to develop a four-day summer camp for students interested in medical careers.

Two dozen students from our district participated in the camp. They learned about career pathways and training programs in high school, and heard from guest speakers currently working in the medical industry.

"I was expecting to have teachers talk to us about the different programs they have, but instead they had hands-on activities," said student Carley Gangler. She plans to pursue a career in the medical field.

Student Amber Serio also plans to pursue a medical career and said Camp Scrubs reinforced her plans.

"I really want to go into medicine, because I have seizures, and I want to be a neurologist to help kids like me," she said.

Overall, about 70 students participated in the camp, which was offered at no cost to students. Plans are already underway for next summer.

Fraser High School Health Sciences Teacher Marti Van Eenenaam-Iwanicki is passionate about health careers and helping students. In addition to teaching a full schedule, she is the advisor for the FHS chapter of HOSA - Future Health Professionals. And, she was recently named one of three national winners of the annual Goodheart-Willcox Outstanding Service Award.

Each state nominated one advisor for the award. Mrs. Van-I knew she was nominated and had made the cut as a regional finalist. But, she didn't know she won until she was at the awards ceremony at the International Leadership Conference in Orlando, Florida.

"My students are often on stage for awards at the ILC ... it was fun for me to have the chance this year," she said. "In fact, our HOSA delegation did not know anything about it until I was there on stage." Goodheart-Wilcox Publishing sponsors the award, and the winners receive a cash award of \$2,000. In addition to advising the FHS chapter of HOSA, Mrs. Van-I has organized the Michigan Region 4 competition each January for many years. This event brings more than 2,500 students to FHS to compete in health-related events.

THE GRIEVANCE PROCEDURE IS ESTABLISHED TO MEET THE REQUIREMENTS OF TITLE II OF THE AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT OF 1990, TITLE VI OF THE EDUCATION AMENDMENT ACT OF 1972, TITLE IX OF THE EDUCATION AMENDMENT ACT OF 1972, SECTION 504 OF THE REHABILITATION ACT OF 1973, AND THE AGE DISCRIMINATION ACT OF 1975.

Section I: Any person may use this grievance procedure to file a complaint of discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, disability or age in the programs or activities that are provided by Fraser Public Schools. The grievance may be brought forward to the Local Civil Rights Coordinator, who is identified by name and job title as:

Section II: The person who believes he/she has a valid basis for grievance shall discuss the grievance informally and on a verbal basis with the local Civil Rights Coordinator, who shall, in turn, investigate the complaint and reply with an answer to the complainant. He/she may initiate formal procedures according to the following steps.

Step 1: A written statement of the grievance signed by the complainant shall be submitted to the Local Civil Rights Coordinator within five (5) business days of receipt of answers to the informal complaint. The Local Civil Rights Coordinator shall further investigate the grievance and reply in writing to the complainant within five (5) days.

Step 2: If the complainant wishes to appeal the written decision of the Local Civil Rights Coordinator, he/she may submit a signed statement of appeal to the Superintendent of Schools within five (5) business days after receipt of the Coordinator's response. The Superintendent shall meet with all parties involved, formulate a conclusion, and respond in writing to the complainant within ten (10) business days after receipt of the coordinator's response.

Step 3: If the complainant remains unsatisfied, he/she may appeal through a signed, written statement to the Board of Education within five (5) business days of his receipt of the Superintendent's response in Step 2. In an attempt to resolve the grievance, the Board of Education shall meet with the concerned parties

and their representative within forty (40) days of the receipt of such an appeal. A copy of the Board's disposition of the appeal shall be sent to each concerned party within ten (10) days of this meeting.

Step 4: If at this point the grievance has not been satisfactorily settled, further appeal may be made to the Office for Civil Rights, Department of Education, 600 Superior Avenue East, Suite 750, Cleveland, OH 44114.

Inquiries concerning the non-discrimination policy may be directed to Office for Civil Rights, Department of Education, 600 Superior Avenue East, Suite 750, Cleveland, OH 44114.

The local Civil Rights Coordinator, on request, will provide a copy of the District's grievance procedure and investigate all complaints in accordance with this procedure.

A copy of each of the Acts and the regulations on which this notice is based may be found in the Local Civil Rights Coordinator's office.

AHERA (ASBESTOS HAZARD EMERGENCY RESPONSE ACT)

The Environmental Protection Agency has determined that airborne asbestos fibers can be a health hazard. The Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA) was passed in 1986. District buildings are monitored every six months and inspected every three years to comply with AHERA regulations. The last inspection was completed in 2016. Updated Management Plans are located in the office of each building and in the Operations & Maintenance Building. Each Plan shows asbestos-related work that has occurred in each building.

REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH AND SEX EDUCATION INSTRUCTION – STATE AID ACT, 1766A

The Board of Education has established a program of health instruction which includes reproductive health and other sex education instruction, as well as serious communicable disease prevention education.

According to applicable law, parents/guardians have the right to review materials or observe classroom instruction; please contact your student's school principal.

This statute also allows you to excuse your child from participation in classes which include such instruction, if you choose. If you wish to exercise your right to excuse your student from this instruction, please send written notice to your student's school principal.

BADGE SYSTEM FOR VISITORS, VOLUNTEERS AND GUEST TEACHERS

For security purposes, the District is continuing its practice of requiring all visitors, volunteers and guest teachers to wear an identification badge while in any school building. All persons entering a school building are requested to immediately report to the main office to obtain an identification badge.



FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS AND PRIVACY ACT (FERPA)

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), a Federal law, requires that Fraser Public Schools, with certain exceptions, obtain your written consent prior to the disclosure of personally identifiable information from your child's education records. However, Fraser Public Schools may disclose appropriately designated "directory information" without written consent, unless you have advised the District to the contrary in accordance with District procedures. The primary purpose of directory information is to allow the Fraser Public Schools to include this type of information from your child's education records in certain school publications. Examples include:

- A playbill, showing your student's role in a drama production;
- The annual yearbook;
- Honor roll or other recognition lists;
- Graduation programs; and
- Sports activity sheets, such as for wrestling, showing weight and height of team members.

Directory information, which is information that is generally not considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if released, can also be disclosed to outside organizations without a parent's prior written consent. Outside organizations include, but are not limited to, companies that manufacture class rings or publish yearbooks. In addition, two federal laws require local educational agencies (LEAs) receiving assistance under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA) to provide military recruiters, upon request, with the following information: names, addresses and telephone listings unless parents have advised the LEA that they do not want their student's information disclosed without their prior written consent.

If you do not want Fraser Public Schools to disclose directory information from your child's education records without your prior written consent, you must notify the District in writing by the end of the second week of the school year. Fraser Public Schools has designated the following information as directory information:

- Electronic mail address
- Photograph
- Participation in officially recognized activities and sports
- Degrees, honors and awards received
- · Major field of study
- The most recent educational agency
- Dates of attendance and institution attended
- Grade level
- Student ID number, user ID, or other unique personal identifier used to communicate in electronic systems that cannot be used to access education records without a PIN, password, etc. (A student's SSN, in whole or in part, cannot be used for this purpose.)

DRUG-FREE SCHOOLS

Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act of 1996 (amends Michigan Public Health code) Public 174 of 1994

The "drug-free zone" surrounding school property is 1,000 feet. Any individual who delivers cocaine, narcotics or certain other illicit substances to a minor student within the 1,000-foot drug-free zone around the school property shall be punished by at least two years in prison and up to three times the term of imprisonment and fine — or both — that would otherwise apply. "School Property" is defined as a "building, playing field or property used for school purposes to impart instruction to children in kindergarten through grade 12, when provided by a public, private, denominational or parochial school, except those buildings used primarily for adult education or college extension courses."

PEST MANAGEMENT PLAN

Dear Parent/Guardian: As a part of the Fraser Public Schools Pest Management Program, pesticides are occasionally applied. You have the right to be informed prior to any pesticide application made to the school grounds and buildings. In certain emergencies, pesticides may be applied without prior notice, but you will be provided notice following any such application.
