Ojibwe people have made maple sugar, a traditional dietary staple, for centuries. It is mostly accessed in the woodlands of Minnesota and can be stored for months without spoiling. While the technology used in the process has changed over the years, Ojibwe people continue to harvest maple sugar in the present day.



Wild rice (Zizania aquatica or Zizania palustris), called manoomin in the Ojibwe language, has been a staple food for Minnesota's Indians for centuries. It was adopted as the official state grain in 1977. It is an aquatic grass that ripens in late summer.



The Ojibwe home is called a wigwam-wigwag. In the winter they made conical-shaped like an upside down cone. They were made out of birch bark and insulated with moss and grasses. In the summer they made dome-shaped wigwags made with birch bark and elm bark. In the fall the dome-shaped wigwags were made with birch bark and bulrush. You can find bulrush where the cattails grow.

The Four Seasons Room

The main attraction of the museum is the awe-inspiring "Four Seasons Room". Featuring life-size dioramas modeled after the actual Mille Lacs Band tribal members. The exhibits were inspired by the personal stories and oral histories of the Mille Lacs Band members.

The dioramas in the current Four Seasons Room were installed in the old museum in 1964, and life-sized mannequins were added in 1972. Then in 1995, the dioramas and mannequins were incorporated into an Enhance setting in the new museum's Four Season Room.
