




Photo 1 | Creating a Kaleidoscope Image in PS



1. **Choose the image you want to use.**
*Good image choices are abstract images and/or those with strong pattern.
2. **Open and edit in Camera Raw** (easiest way to open in CR is to use Adobe Bridge, select the image, right click and choose "Open in Camera Raw")
3. When you are finished editing, click "**Open image,**" and the image will open in PS
4. **Save it now!** MSteward_Kaleidoscope_EC.psd
*Save periodically (Ctrl +S)
5. In the layers panel, **click on the lock icon** on the image layer to unlock it.




6. **Enlarge the canvas:**
 - On the file menu go to Image > Canvas Size
 - Make your settings look like this in the dialogue box:




Choose Percent, and type 200 for both W and H

7. **Duplicate the layer:** Select layer in layers panel and hit Ctrl + J
8. **Rename the layers:**
 - Double click on the layer name and type new name
 - Name the bottom layer "Top L" and the top layer "Top R"
9. **Move the "Top R" layer** directly right until it's edges just align with the "Top L" image:



- Make sure the "Top R" layer is active by clicking on it in the layers panel
 - Select the Move Tool and click and drag until the image edges align
10. **Flip the "Top R" layer horizontally:**
 - Make sure the "Top R" layer is active by clicking on it in the layers panel

- Go to Edit > Transform > Flip Horizontal
11. **Select both layers and flip vertically:**
 - Click on the "Top L" layer, hold Shift, click on the "Top R" layer
 - Hit Ctrl + J to duplicate both
 - Go to Edit > Transform > Flip Vertical
 12. **Move the new layers:**
 - With both layers still selected, grab the Move Tool and click and drag until the image edges line up with the top images
 - You can rename the layers "Bottom L" and "Bottom R"



13. **Tada!**
14. **Make sure to save one final time.** *Teacher will check off for points.
