

Discovery and History of The Susquehannocks

 Also known as the CONESTOGA, were mainly Iroquoian speaking tribes that settled along the Susquehanna from New York, Pennsylvania, and Maryland.




Discovery and History cont.

• First discovered and recorded by Capt. John Smith in the Chesapeake Bay Area in 1608

• Capt. John smith first made contact with what he called the "Susquehannocks" near Port Deposit md., where he followed them up river to

their village






Myth of The Susquehannocks Size



- From the Journal of Capt. John Smith, the Susquehannock tribes-people were reported to clock in at over **7 feet tall**
 - Under an illustration of a
 Susquehannock on John Smith's
 map, "The Susquehannocks are a
 Giant-like People and thus
 attired"

Fact of Size

- However, due to bone analysis and skeletal observation, we can confirm that male susquehannocks were at most over 4 inches taller than the Average Height of A Male European (Avg. of "5'3)
- Their calves were said to have a circumference of 27 inches, and while that may be true, due to this information they were most likely thinner than recorded.




So What Happened To the Susquehannocks?

- In 1600, the population of the tribe was recorded around 5,000, to 7,000
- As time went on however, with their dangerous rivalry against the Iroquois Confederation, they slowly died off due to numerous wars and battles



What Happened Cont.



- In 1697, what few hundred tribes-people still existed settled in Conestoga village, where they died off due to history and hate towards the tribe by English settlers
- In PA today, roughly 200 to 300 people can take a DNA test, and have roots traced back to the Susquehannock tribes

Additional Info.

One key point to keep in your mind on this presentation, is that the Susquehannocks were a largely independent people. Their name wasn't even theirs, it was given to them by the Iroquois Confederation. They kept to themselves, hunted on their own grounds, and when a battle broke out and they won, most rather than not, they would leave behind no enemies.
