Vocabulary

- Deckle- Screen contraption used to make pieces of paper from recycled goop. (Like a cookie cutter!)
- Slurry- Thin Wet Blended paper scraps.
- Pulp- Thick, wet blended paper scraps used to create new paper. (Like pulp in orange juice!)



Materials:



- Towels,
- shredded or ripped paper scrap,
- blender,
- large empty plastic bin,
- deckles x5,
- drying rack,
- pencils (or markers)

You can add multiple colors to your paper!
You just need two colors of slurry!



You can use all kinds of fun things in your paper pulp and slurry like leaves plants and more!




You can add glitter to your slurry!



You can decorate your paper when it is dry!

Procedure

Pulling Paper using Class Intro to deckles and leaving Discussion/Critique papermaking/Examples of them out to dry Activity Art made from paper. Reclaiming recycled Scrap paper collection

Soak Paper strips in bowls of water.



Put paper chunks in blender after soaking.



Add water to the blender.



Blend it up! You may need to repeat this several times and add more water.



Pour out Paper pulp and add water as needed.



Pour slurry into large tub or container.



Dunk Deckle and Screen into the slurry. Let all the water drain out



Plop the paper onto a towel, cardboard, or felt and let dry.



Prepare to paint or decorate paper. Paint works nicely! You may also use markers.



Let your project dry and enjoy the finished result!
