## Voorhees School Social Workers' Newsletter for Parents of Students with Special Needs

This newsletter is to provide parents with helpful information to support their children's learning and achievement in school

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Please mark your calendars now to attend the <u>next Parent Meeting on Wednesday, April 18, 2012 in the</u> <u>Voorhees Middle School Library from 9:30 AM to 11:00 AM.</u> This will be a Transition Open House, geared to parents of current 5<sup>th</sup> graders with special needs who are concerned about what to expect in the way of educational and special services at the Voorhees Middle School. It will be an opportunity to meet some of the staff involved with 6<sup>th</sup> graders, tour the 6<sup>th</sup> grade wing and hear about tentative plans for the 2012-13 school year. We hope to see many of you there.

#### Annual Review Meetings

We have begun planning for annual reviews. You are encouraged to review your child's current status and discuss with his/her teacher any concerns that you may have. This will enable all of us to problem solve collaboratively and create a plan for 2012-13 that addresses all identified areas of need.

Our next meeting will be held on April 23<sup>rd</sup> in the VMS Lecture Hall at 7:00 pm. All parents are welcome to attend.

#### Middle School Transition Survey Results (2012/2013 school year)

A survey was sent to the parents of 5<sup>th</sup> grade students who currently receive Special Education Services. This three page survey was designed to help provide information that would be most useful during the transition from Elementary School to Voorhees Middle School. We received nineteen completed surveys. The following information is the result of the parent surveys:

#### 1. The first question asked "Is this your first child attending VMS?"

For eleven parents, this is their first child to attend VMS.

#### 2. The second question asked "If no, was your other child's experience positive or negative?"

Eight parents stated that the experience was positive for their child, and only one parent reported a negative experience. The remaining ten parents reported it was not applicable.

# 3. <u>The third question asked parents "What is the most important information parents needed to know to help their child make a smooth transition into VMS (from most to least reported) were as follows:</u>

*Extremely*: sixth grade academic programs, adolescent challenges, self expectations of student, responsibility of student, contact information/communication with staff, progress reporting information/parent portal, code of conduct, scheduling, guidance role, homework, technology

Very: grading, club/activities, supplies for students

Somewhat: lunch room procedure, lockers

# 4. <u>The fourth question asked parents "What other information that could be useful in helping your child make a smooth transition into VMS?"</u>

- 1) Transition from private school to VMS (public school)
- 2) Layout of the school and transition from class to class
- 3) What special education programs are available and offered
- 4) Socialization of middle school students

# 5. <u>The fifth question asked parents</u>, "How does my child feel about attending VMS?" The following responses were <u>provided:</u>

- 1) Happy and Excited (11 parents)
- 2) Nervous (8 parents)
- 3) Relaxed and nonchalant (2 parents)

#### 6. <u>In response to the sixth question, "My child is most concerned about?" The following concerns were reported:</u>

Socialization, bullying, changing clothes for gym, overall school experience, amount of homework, difficulty of classes, activities and grading, having new teachers and meeting new peers, getting lost, making new friends, adjusting to new teachers and lockers

# 7. <u>In response to the seventh question, "As a parent of a middle school student, I am most concerned about?" The following concerns were noted :</u>

Students being challenged academically and adapting to new classes; staying organized and getting work done; how the four elementary schools will integrate socially; academics and homework; child being overwhelmed and concerns with self-confidence; bullying; bus transportation; transitioning to VMS (larger school)

### 8. In response to question eight, "Will you be attending the 5<sup>th</sup> to 6<sup>th</sup> grade transition meeting on April 18<sup>th</sup>, 2012?"

Every parent who responded to the survey will be attending the transition meeting on April 18<sup>th</sup> from 9:30-11:00am

## 9. In response to question nine, "What questions would you like answered during the transition meeting?" The following responses were included:

- 1) What are the available special education programs, classes and accommodations?
- 2) What is the role of the guidance counselor?
- 3) How do most students adapt to VMS?
- 4) What are tools to ease the transition for your child into VMS?
- 5) How are health concerns addressed at VMS?

We hope these results have provided useful information to you. We will certainly do our best to address the concerns both you and your child have shared about transition into VMS. We are looking forward to a successful school year for your child!

There is a free orientation at the end of August that mirrors the school day sponsored by the Guidance Department. An additional program entitled "Mastering the 6<sup>th</sup> Grade" is also available in the summer.
