PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT PAGE

Members of the site council team are working to create and implement a literacy framework at Pacific Crest. This framework will help to build a culture of literacy to guide teaching and learning practices. Read our statement of practice as well as the core beliefs that guide teaching and learning. Core beliefs related to reading, speaking, and listening will be added in the near future.

STATEMENT OF PRACTICE

Literacy is the ability to use language to read, write, listen, speak, view, and think critically about ideas. Literacy empowers individuals as active participants in a democratic society. The development of literacy is nuanced, complex, and individualized. Literacy is a process that builds on prior knowledge, culture, identity, and experiences in order to build new knowledge and understanding.

BELIEFS ABOUT WRITING

- **People Learn to Write by Writing.** The more students write, the easier it becomes, and the more motivate they are to do it.

Implications for teaching & learning - Writing instruction must include significant in-class and outof-class opportunities to write for varied purposes and varied audiences.

- *Writing is a Tool for Thinking.* The act of writing generates ideas that are fluid. This process helps students solve problems, identity potential misconceptions, reflect, and ask probing and clarifying questions.

Implications for teaching & learning- Vary the purpose for why students write. Create opportunities for students to write for an intended audience, but also provide opportunities for students to write for themselves. Metacognitive thinking comes with practice.

- Writing and Reading are Related. Students who read a lot have a much easier time getting better at writing. In contrast, writing also helps students become better readers. Writers learn text structure when they read, and readers learn how language is constructed when they write.

Implications for teaching & learning - To help students become better writers, students must have extended time to read. This extended time includes both in and out of school practice. Students should be exposed to exemplars as models of proficient text.

- Writing has a Complex Relationship to Talk. "Writing exists in a nest of talk." Writers talk in order to rehearse text. Speaking with peers, teachers, and others provides context for developing written communication. With practice, writers develop a unique and individualized "voice."

Implications for teaching & learning - Create opportunities for students to practice speaking and listening in both formal and informal settings. After students write, share student and teacher writing in order to normalize writing as a function of speaking.

- Assessment of Writing involves Complex, Informed, Human Judgement. Like all learning, targeted feedback helps students grow. The assessment of student writing should include specific and targeted outcomes.

Implications for teaching & learning - Before students write, specific outcomes, targets, or goals should be clearly communicated to students. Feedback to students should only address these clearly stated outcomes. It is not possible to assess each and every aspect of writing, nor is it developmentally appropriate for middle level learners.
