

#### Selected Guidelines

The Piano Magnet is a six-year program designed to develop young keyboard musicians in a well-rounded, repertoire based curriculum. As such, the curriculumm is differentiated for students at all proficiency levels, and all students perform for one another. Students will learn technical, aural and analytical skills. They will delve into the the historical and cultural aspects of music. They will explore the many uses of their piano skills, including collaboration, accompanying, solo work, improvisation and composition. Students in all grades will play solos for adjudicated events, occasional social events and school concerts and recitals. Some students will be eligible for a weekly studio lesson with an adjunct teacher. At the end of their six year program, students will have acquired a vast musical and pianistic knowledge that will prepare them to audition for college programs in performance and music education.

#### Program Goals:

- To pursue excellence in music and piano studies and to achieve steady growth
- To gain an understanding of the inner workings of music: theory, career readiness and collaboration
- To pursue perform in recital at least twice a year in each of their six programm years
- To perform for feedback and a rating at the annual Solo & Ensemble Adjudicated Events: Ohio Music Education [O.M.E.A.] for grades 9-12 and the Junior High Solo & Ensemble Adjudicated Event grades 7-9
- To attend live, in-school performance from Muse Machine and other arts groups

#### Step-By-Step Audition Process:

- Choose a piece to play. Don't choose the most difficult piece you have played, but rather one that you have mastered and that will show the most advanced level of proficiency. You may use a piece from your teacher or print one of your selections.
- Pieces appropriate for the audition are attached. Remember: you want to play the pieces that represent you at your very best!

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#### Audition Process Continued:

#### How to Prepare for the Audition:

• Prior to the audition date, the student can prepare C Major Scale and G Major Scale, along with a piece of the student's choice, or a selection from the attached pieces;


The audition has six [6] parts:

- 1] Contact Form
- 2] Warm-up
- 3] Playing a. Scales b. Chosen Piece c. Sight-Reading
- 4] Interview
- 5] Quiz
- 6] Essay...write about why you want to be a student musician at Stivers School for the Arts

The Contact Form 1] will be given to the student at Check-In and should be completed before the audition performance time. The essay 6] can also be written ahead of the audition. The student will check in at the table located outside of the Piano Lab, and will be offered a room for warming up 2].

- 3a] The scales required are C Major and G Major scales, one octave, hands together.
- **3b**] You will play your pieces for two judges in the Piano Lab studio.
- **3c**] Sight-reading tells us how you understand musical notation. You cannot prepare for this part.
- 4] We want to know about you: how you began playing the piano, who your teacher is [ if you have one], and what other interests you have. Also it helps to have your parents' email and phone number and your street address. You could prepare this in advance and bring it with you.
- 5] The quiz is a basic musical aptitude test and should only take about ten minutes to complete.
- **6**] We will give you a quiet place to write your essay and answer the quiz. We will collect it before a student helps you find your way back to the main entrance of Stivers.


