DISTRICT LEVEL HIGHLIGHTS

As our successes are a tribute to the collaboration of our entire community, we invite all to share in some of those highlights from the 2015-2016 school year.

We are pleased to report that graduation rates have risen once again to 89.2%, higher than the state's average (88.4%) and national average (82.3%).

The State Superintendent again honored several of our schools as Schools of Recognition for their work during the 2014-15 school year: Morgan, Roy Chapman Andrews Academy (3 years in a row) and Converse Elementary School (5 years in a row). Converse was also a State Department of Public Instruction Spotlight School, promoted to other state districts from which to learn.

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Four of our teachers earned National Board Certification this year - the highest level a teacher can reach: Terri Ross and Jan Albert (pictured below). We are now up to eight NBC teachers in the district, on par with the national average of 1-2% of teachers.



A ribbon cutting was held for the new Fruzen Intermediate Schools, with additional dedications held for the Barbara Hickman Fine Arts Center and Jim Caldwell Gymnasium.



Several more of our teachers were selected by the Beloit Rotary Club as Teachers of the Month, including: Jen Murry (McNeel), Andre DeKok (BMHS), Jean Simmons (Merrill), Joylyn Weibel (Converse), and Audrey Vaughn (McNeel).

Even Start

Our Even Start program is still going strong, including the following highlights from this past year:

- 75 adult students registered with BTC ESL program
- Adult Even Start students consistently exceed state gains in functional levels.
- 71 children attend Beloit Even Start birth-4K
- Even Start Dancers have performed 17 times in the stateline area.
- This year 3 students who started Even Start as babies and continued through the program have received scholarships to attend college:
 - o 1 received a full ride scholarship to UW-Madison.
 - o 1 received a full ride to Coe College in Iowa
 - 1 received a sports scholarship for soccer to Viterbo University.

We are pleased to be named a WI DPI School of Recognition for the fifth year in a row, as well as a Spotlight School for the second consecutive year, with visits this year from Milwaukee, Sheboygan and Janesville observing our practices. Hackett had a great school year! We've added new programs and partnerships with community members to help enhance the services and resources we offer our students and families. We are so proud of the way Hackett staff and community members have come together to truly invest in the teaching of the WHOLE student, including partnerships with Caritas Food Pantry and UW-Extension.

Meeting Family Needs

Hackett hosted an English class for Spanish speaking parents for 10 weeks during the school year. Childcare was provided and all materials were paid for through a Stateline Community Foundation grant.

A new partnership was developed with Caritas food pantry and 35 families received backpacks full of food twice a month throughout the school year.

Hackett staff organized a Holiday Bazaar that was free to students and their families. We had 181 adults attend. The Bazaar offered free bedding, decorations, books, toys, games and clothing. Our student services staff has worked diligently to



ensure that students and families are getting the counseling services needed to be successful both inside and outside of school.

In an effort to build bridges between staff and Latino families, we hosted ESL Parent Teacher Connection Night. Our families and staff feasted on food prepared by all; pinatas were broken; talented student singers and dancers entertained; and students' hands created a wonderful message to all. ESL PT night was held in hopes that despite language barriers ALL families would feel welcome and supported within the walls of Hackett School.

Community Connections

Hackett strengthened its partnership with Beloit College this year and had 21 college students volunteer weekly in our lunch buddy and reading buddy program. We have 11 additional volunteers from the community that spend time with students

regularly. Additionally, Beloit Professor, Kylie Quave, reached out to our ESL Department to host/create a Pop Up Museum. Quave and her anthropology class provided fun activities and an avenue for students to celebrate and share their heritage.

The members of Student Council organized a Penny War and raised \$558.20, given to Holly's Kids and Caritas.

Gym teacher Sarah Cary and a group of students have teamed up with UW Extension and formed a garden club, learning about healthy eating. They built three raised garden beds on the school grounds.

Hackett's MEO Advisor (Minority Excellence Organization), Janay Banks-Wilson asked teachers to pick students in second and third grade to participate in an Empowerment Monday group. Wilson invites members of the Beloit community to talk to students about the importance of education and overcoming adversity to become successful and productive members of our community. Due to the partnership established with the anthropology class, the Empowerment club students were able to attend a tour of Beloit College and the Logan Museum.



Wilson also organized Hackett's first Read Your Heart Out event to celebrate African American Parent Involvement Day. The event invites family and community into the school to read to students and celebrate African American culture folklore. Students participated in different activities throughout the day including, creating a kente cloth, taste testing soul food, watching the Knightingales perform and listening to a solo performance of a spiritual folklore.

Todd staff continues to grow and develop their understanding of RtI. We were very excited to receive from DPI a School of Merit award for the implementation of RtI and PBIS in our building.

We were excited to include an Early Childhood Phono Group this year, as well as 4K and 3rd Grade Dual Language Immersion this year.

We celebrated many different family activities throughout the school year including Cultural Night and Grandparents Day!

A building goal for Todd is to actively seek students to participate in at least 2 extracurricular activities each year. We have Student Council, Just Say No Club, Spirit Squad, Drama Club, Destination Imagination, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, after school sports, second grade after school reading club in collaboration with Beloit College, and EXCCEL after school programming.



Todd School was fortunate to receive the 21st century grant for a third cycle. We are in our 12th year of the EXCCEL after school program at Todd. 
