

The Lowndes County School District (LCSD) had a record five schools earn a grade of A Thursday when the Mississippi Department of Education (MDE) released accountability grades for the 2022-23 school year.

Caledonia High School (total score of 846), New Hope High (785), Caledonia Elementary School (540), Caledonia Middle School (477) and New Hope Elementary (456) helped the LCSD receive an overall grade of A. The LCSD had 699 total points and was one of 57 schools in the state to receive a grade of A.

Caledonia High, Caledonia Middle, Caledonia Elementary and New Hope Elementary repeated as A schools from 2021-22, while New Hope High joined their ranks after receiving a grade of B last year.

“Caledonia High School is an A school and rated the No. 15 high school in the state, according to the latest testing data,” CHS Principal Gregory Elliott said. “Recently, CHS was named a 2023 Blue Ribbon School and ranked as the 21<sup>st</sup> high school in Mississippi by U.S. News & World Report. Caledonia High School’s ratings are a testament to the hard work of our staff and students and their dedication to academic excellence. I’m so proud of our staff and students. This is an incredible accomplishment.”
