Course Description:

Psychology is the study of the behavior and mental processes. Psychology is a science that seeks to <u>describe</u>, <u>predict</u>, <u>understand</u> and <u>influence</u> maladaptive, [patterns that can hurt self and others], thoughts and behavior. There are multiple theories and approaches in Psychology, some successful for one type of disorder but not for another. Motivation, moods, memory, reactions, attitudes, perceptions, attraction, talent, what you enjoy – or despise – all of these things have their roots in your Psychology. While Psychology is in the Social Science curriculum; it is in reality a Behavioral Science that often overlaps with the Natural Sciences.

This is an introductory course and will broadly cover several areas. Students will be expected to examine and have verbal discussion about different concepts. Basic terms, concepts, and principles of psychology are introduced as well as contradicting viewpoints as to how these basic factors can be interpreted. Topics such as emotion, experience, meaning, perception, learning, behavior, personality, and self-concept are reviewed through discussion, lecture, introspection, journal writing, observation, case studies, handouts, a basic text, movies, and field projects. It is expected that students in this course would be willing to make a strong individual preparation in order to share their ideas and, on occasion, engage in group learning tasks. A major goal of the course is to expand our basic curiosity to a point where we can make legitimate evaluative statements about socially significant behavior and the psychological implications for issues now confronting society.

- > Building of their reading, writing and evaluation and discussion skills

Grading:

Student grades are available and updated regularly on PowerSchool.

Students will receive various **class work** and **homework** assignments throughout the course of the quarter. Such assignments will include, but are not limited to, textbook readings/questions, note-taking, hand-outs, and case studies. All classwork is due by the end of the class block. Homework is due at the beginning of class before the tardy bell rings, or it is considered late, losing 15 points.

Tests:

Following each unit of study, students will be formally assessed through unit **tests**. Unit tests will consist of matching, multiple choice, short answer, and/or essay questions. Students will be responsible for all unit material discussed in class and assigned for homework, as such are subject to inclusion on unit tests.

Papers/Projects/Presentations:

Throughout the course of the semester, students will be assigned essays, **projects**, and **presentations** (group and/or individual). Such assignments will be assessed through content, as well as grammar, organization, structure, and neatness. All papers are to be written in (MLA) format.

Quizzes:

Students will be formally assessed regularly through **quizzes**, which will serve as "benchmarks" to monitor student learning. Quizzes will often consist of multiple choice, short-answer and essay questions. Students will be responsible for reviewing designated course material, as such will be included in each quiz.

Journal Responses/Do-Now's:

As Psychology is a course that allows students to reflect on their own experiences, students will keep a **journal** throughout the duration of the course. In addition, students will frequently be required to respond to "**Writing prompts**" questions in their journals at the beginning of the class period. "Writing prompts" questions will serve as an opportunity for students to anticipate the current day's lesson, as well as review and be evaluated on prior material. Writing prompt journals will be collected on every Friday we are here, and returned on Monday.

Participation:

Students are also responsible for **participating** in class. Class participation includes, but is not limited to, arriving to class on time, being prepared (having their textbook, notebook, folder, assignments, pens, and pencils), partaking in classroom activities and assignments, asking and answering questions, and being actively involved in class discussions.

Absence/Tardiness:

Students who are missing work due to absence or tardiness are **responsible** for acquiring all work that they have missed

Late Assignments:

For absent students. Student will have **5 days** after an assignment is due to make arrangements with the teacher to complete missing assignment or improve his/her grade. First day late 15 points will be deducted. After 5 days the assignment can be made up of a maximum of 50% minus effort.

Classroom Rules

- 18. Do not leave classroom without permission and a pass
- 19. No passes will be written the first 30 minutes of class, or the last 15 minutes of class, all passes have a 5 minute time limit or you will serve detention: 5 to 10 minutes

- 20. Bathroom passes will only be issued as stated above unless you have a doctor's note filed with the nurse. If it is an emergency, you will have to serve 5 minutes of lunch detention
- 21. Arrive on time and prepared to learn. Always come to class with necessary class material (If not there is a resource center for your needs)
