
Question Formation Technique (QFT)

- 1. Write down all of your questions about your topic. .
 - a. Each question goes on it's own post-it note.
 - b. You must have AT LEAST 20 post-its.
- 2. Draw the venn diagram below on your whiteboard.
 - a. Open-Ended Can't be answered with a few words.
 - i. Example: How do humans affect air quality?
 - b. Related to Topic The question must be about your topic.
 - c. Researchable There is more to learn more about the topic. It's based in factual information.
 - i. Example: Is a spider an insect?



- 3. Put the post-it notes in the correct section on the venn diagram.
 - a. If a question fits into two categories, put it in the overlap.
 - b. If a question fits into all 3 categories, put it in the middle.
- 4. Rewrite or combine questions that only fall into 1 or 2 categories so that the question can be moved into the very middle section.
 - a. You must have at least 10 questions that fit into all 3 categories.
- 5. Gallery Walk
 - a. When you look at another poster, write feedback on their questions.
 - i. FIII in at least 1 praise card (good thing they did)
 - ii. Fill in at least 1 polish card (thing they could improve)
- 6. Revise your questions based on the feedback.
- 7. Type your finalized questions into your Process Journal.
