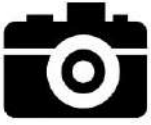


Reflection Photography



In photography, reflection photography is when light reflects off a surface rather than through the surface



Reflection photography, also referred to as mirror photography, is when **you use reflective surfaces to create an artistic photograph**. Using water, windows, puddles, spoon, mirrors or any sort of **reflective** surface can change an image into a work of art.



Reflective surfaces could include the following:

- Puddles (turn on your hose and make one)
- Bodies of water if you live near the ocean, shoot during low tide
- Spoons, Knives (especially a butcher knife)
- Windows
- Skyscrapers often have a reflective surface
- Metal from any surface
- Mirrors, you can put them on the ground and shoot from above
- Back Window of a Car
- Rear-view mirror
- Sun Glasses
- Bubbles



Step 1: Find a reflective surface within your home environment: kettle, mirror, window, spoon, glass, puddle
Get close to the reflective surface and try different camera angles.

Step 2: Once you have found a reflective surface, take photo of reflection and background. Mix reality with reflective surface. Be careful not to take just the reflection.
