

Students entering 8<sup>th</sup> grade at Readington Middle School should have received their selected book(s) at the end of the school year, if school supplied, from their 7<sup>th</sup> grade reading teacher. If a student did not receive their school supplied novel, a book may be picked up at the RMS front office. (Please call ahead to confirm pick up: 908-534-2113) These books are to be returned at the beginning of the 2014-2015 academic school year to the 8<sup>th</sup> grade language arts teacher. Work should be completed by September 4<sup>th</sup> and can be e-mailed to your teacher or brought with you on the first day of school. Students will be using their summer reading responses in the first week of study.

- 1. Pilots keep a log of how many hours they have flown. Baseball players keep stats on how many hits they get and runs they score. Actors keep records of their starring roles. It's only natural, then, that readers keep a list of what they're reading. Use the Reading Record to track your reading this summer Rate each title with a 1-5 star rating, with 1 being poor and 5 being terrific, add a comment, and write the date that you began and finished your book. Bring your reading record sheet to school with you on September 4<sup>th</sup> or e-mail it ahead of time.
- 2. Please purchase your Reader's Notebook to complete journal entries for your books. Write a journal entry after you have read about two to three chapters. Write a second entry when you reach the middle of your book, and a final entry when you finish the book. Record three, one-page entries for each book read on page 3, 4, and 5 of the readers workshop marble note book. Each student will also need a 1/2" 3-ring clear-view binder with a a set of five dividers for handouts
