RHS Counseling: What Should I be Doing in 12th Grade?

• Throughout the year

- Know what courses you must pass for graduation. (This is great practice for college.)
- Stay on top of your college application, trade school application or military enlistment
- Plan your time. There is a lot to balance this year.
- Keep in touch with your overall well being and check in with us if you need anything

• Recommended Standardized Tests

- SAT or ACT:
 - Some colleges are not requiring standardized tests this year for admission. They
 may be required for merit scholarships. Keep track of the requirements.
 - Students may register for the SAT at <u>www.collegeboard.com</u> or the ACT at <u>www.actstudent.org</u>
- SAT II Tests:
 - No colleges in Michigan need SAT IIs, most colleges do not.
- AP Tests:
 - Registering for an AP test takes place in the fall. You will be given a join code by your teacher to submit and register with CollegeBoard. You will then pay RCS for each test and provide proof of payment to the counseling office.
- Fall
 - Counselors hold a senior meeting to review the college application process and your post high school plans in the second week of school
 - Small group senior meetings take place after the mass meeting
 - Open lunch sessions are held on Tuesdays in October
 - Apply to colleges as soon as you are able to complete a thorough application

 - Sign up for the RHS College Representative Visits for the colleges you're applying to
 - Why? The person visiting is the person reading your application.
 - Great time to ask housing, scholarship, and other questions
 - Attend the RCS College Fair usually in October
 - Attend the RCS Financial Aid Presentation
 - Usually Oct 1st: Begin filling out the FAFSA for student aid (grants and loans), likely Dec 1st for 2024-25 students
- Winter
 - Dec 1st: Begin filling out the FAFSA for student aid (grants and loans)
 - January Counselors host College App/Post High School Planning Day for seniors who have not applied yet
 - Seniors who fail a 1st Semester Class need to meet with a counselor to check on graduation requirements
- Spring
 - Weigh the pros and cons of all of the colleges who offer admission
 - This choice is unique to your goals and your family circumstances
 - May 1st: Turn in your enrollment deposit to your selected college before this date
 - Take your AP Tests if applicable
 - Pass all of your classes
 - Celebrate your accomplishments and relax!

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RHS College Application Outline

- Begin applying to colleges asap
- Most students apply to 3-4 colleges
- Every college application has at least three components: application, transcripts, and test scores.
- Very few may require letters of recommendation.
- 1. Application.
 - a. This is on their website, the Common Application, or the Coalition Application
 - b. You must hit "Submit" on the application and turn in all required documents by the deadline
- 2. Transcripts
 - a. RHS sends your transcripts electronically to the colleges you apply to
 - b. Go to <u>www.parchment.com</u> and create an account
 - c. Order transcripts for each college you are applying to (Or to common app/coalition app)
 - d. Complete your orders by mid-October to ensure they get to colleges by November 1st
- 3. Standardized Test Scores
 - a. Many (if not most) colleges are not requiring them for admission this year, but they may require them for merit scholarships. Keep track of each college!
 - b. If you take a test, you can choose three colleges to send scores to when you register. This will save you time and money!
 - c. Plan to place an order for your scores to be sent to colleges at least 30 days prior to the college's deadline.
 - i. SAT scores: log into <u>www.collegeboard.com</u> directly to send your scores to the colleges you are applying to (if you took it, and if they require it)
 - ii. ACT scores: log into <u>www.actstudent.org</u> directly to send your scores to the colleges you are applying to (if you took it, and if they require it)
- 4. Letters of Recommendation (not needed by every college):
 - a. If your college requires a letter of recommendation, ask your teachers for a letter of recommendation ASAP. If a college does not require one, they likely do not want one.
 - b. Add your teacher and counselor to the "recommender" portion of your applications by mid-September

Additional College Related Information

- 1. FAFSA Free Application for Federal Student Aid
 - a. This is the only way to get need-based financial aid or any federal student loans
 - b. Opens October 1st/December 1st likely for 2024-25 and should be finished as soon as possible
