NORTHWEST OUTWARD BOUND SCHOOL

Outward Bound is one of the most established names in wilderness education. In 2012, the Portland Schools Program was launched to bring the principles of wilderness education into the classroom. The program is a semester long progression of team-building activities and discussions centered on self worth, teamwork, culture and diversity, leadership, and service. Physical activities such as rock climbing and high ropes courses are interwoven to put lessons into practice and enable students to challenge their perceived limitations. Within the Reynolds School District, NWOBS currently provides programming to RHS AVID 9 & 10 students, the RLA Leadership Class, and AVID 7 & 8 students at all three middle schools.




